As we head into the 3rd month of 2021, we have a lot to be thankful for. Most importantly, many Rotary members in our District have received or are beginning to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. I love how almost every club I visit has a Happy Dollar announcement from a Rotarian who just received their first or second dose. This is news worth celebrating! *At 8pm last night, I received a call from a local pastor that the food distribution they had planned for today fell through. They had planned for a USDA truckload of commodities, and due to logistics, the trucking company cancelled. She needed help to make good on her promise to feed neighbors near the Church. I sent Richard Boone and Sherry Anderson at the Food Bank an urgent email to help. At this VERY moment, they are loading a truckful of Farmers to Families (and more) from our Rotary Clubs and headed over to be the heroes (Food Bank) to the heroes (Church) to feed our neighbors."*

## HANWASH Update

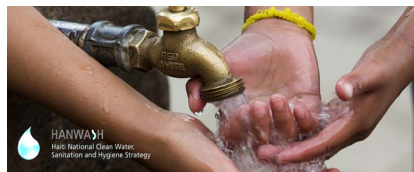

The many operational and monetary challenges involved in the successful implementation of the Haiti National Clean Water Sanitation and Hygiene Strategy, more commonly known to Rotarians as HANWASH, continues to mount in the COVID environment. The Rotary focus in March is Water and Sanitation, so we asked our District 6910 HANWASH Chairperson, Dr. Suchet Loois, to provide our members a current update on the program.

Haiti National Clean Water Sanitation and Hygiene Strategy (HANWASH) is a District 7020, Rotary International (RI) transformational program that began in 2018 when Barry Rassin was RI President. It is a Zone 30-34 program.

HANWASH is designed to be implemented over several decades and may cost more than \$2 billion. RI will cover up to 20% of the cost and the remainder should be leveraged from the private sector and major donors operating in Haiti and around the world. This program is administered by a diverse, 18-member Steering Committee (SC) which continues making progress.

To date, RI has funded two Global Grants (GG) focusing on one pilot commune: Cavaillon, South of Haiti. Those two GG were administered by the Rotary Club of Les Cayes. It will cost about \$2 million to complete the work. It may cost the same for each of the 144 communes in Haiti.

Since there is no GG in this 20-21 Rotary year, the SC is now applying for multiple grants from large donors like World Bank, USAID, UNICEF, and World Vision. There was a formal board meeting, and the SC with eleven subcommittees planned to diversify the fundraiser.

They plan to work in one pilot commune in each of the four OREPAs (regional boundaries) once funding becomes available. They include the following:

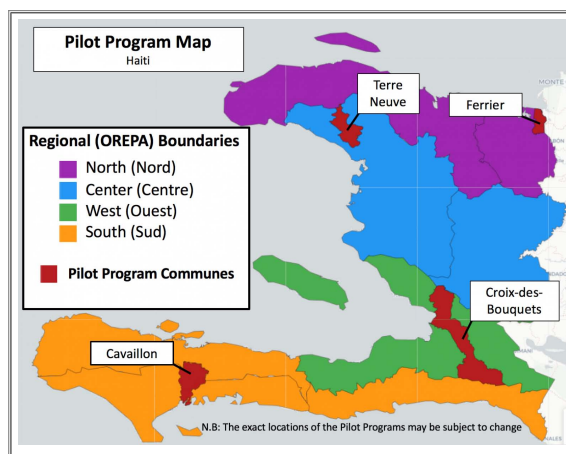
They have identified Champion Districts for the four pilot Communes.

The SC requests that Districts and individuals make contributions toward a grant or a pilot commune's water and sanitation activities. They will use club and individual donations as matching funds.

The HANWASH District 6910 leadership reminds Clubs and Rotarians that there was no RI matching fund left this year for any of these projects. Therefore, they are asking any Rotarians or Clubs that want to contribute to send their contributions to the HANWASH donor fund with the understanding that there will be no credit toward the Paul Harris award. Hopefully, next year the SC will apply and receive a RI Global Grant.

It is important to remember the history of HANWASH to strengthen our present commitment to sustaining its successes in the long haul. The 2007-2008 RI President Wilfrid Wilkinson traveled to Haiti to attend a water and sanitation summit organized by the Rotary Club of Petionville. His theme was "*Rotary Shares*." At the time he met with the Haitian President, the late Rene Preval, and made a Rotarian pledge to map out water resources throughout the country for the purpose of solving the long-term water and sanitation dilemma in the country. During this event, PRIP Wilf planted the seed of HANWASH, so to speak. He told us, "If one strong common thread exists among our 1.2 million members, it is our willingness to share."

From the outset, our District 6910 and Rotarians welcomed the call to support HANWASH and to share our time, talents, expertise, and money to contribute to HANWASH's successful, multi-decade implementation and help ALL Haitians enjoy affordable access to potable water and sanitation.

### GREAT SERVICE PROJECT IDEAS FOR WATER & SANITATION MONTH

March is Water and Sanitation Month. Here are some great service project ideas that your club can





participate in to help protect our waterways and environment:

1. **Adopt-a-Road:** Select a road in your community and coordinate a cleanup by picking up litter and other debris such as tires, car parts, illegal signs and more. These types of cleanups will prevent litter from ending up in our precious waterways. If you have a Keep America Beautiful affiliate in your area, they will gladly provide you with supplies to conduct your cleanup and even remove the debris for you.

2. **Adopt-a-Stream:** Is there a stream, lake or pond near you that has been an eyesore due to litter or invasive plants? Take the initiative by coordinating a cleanup to remove debris and/or privet removal. If you want to expand your impact, consider participating in a training workshop in your area to learn how to monitor water quality and care for a local waterway.

3. **Storm Drain Stenciling Program:** Storm drains are designed to prevent flooding by carrying rainwater from our streets and rivers. They can become clogged with leaves, grass, litter, which can cause flooding and pollution to flow into our state's precious streams and rivers. Organize a group to clean up storm drains. Many counties offer programs through the Storm Drain Stenciling Program where concerned citizens and volunteers stencil "No Dumping ... Leads To Stream" on catch basins. Educational material is included for distribution to provide important information to residents about non-point pollution and ways to reduce it on their property. Supporting our environment is one of the many ways Rotarians can bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact of strengthening the conservation and protection of natural resources, ecological sustainability and making our world a better place.

They distributed approximately 150 gift card packets worth more than \$100 and 150 thank-you cards with personal messages of thanks to Rabun County's front-line healthcare workers.



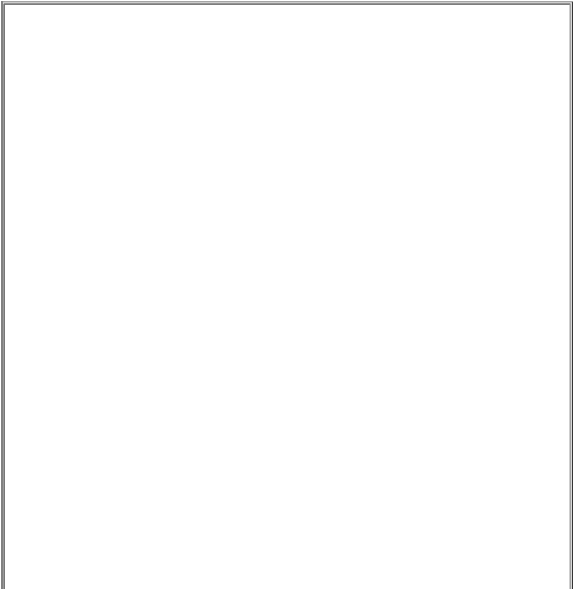


During these times, our team is dealing with unprecedented demands both personally and professionally, as are all Americans.

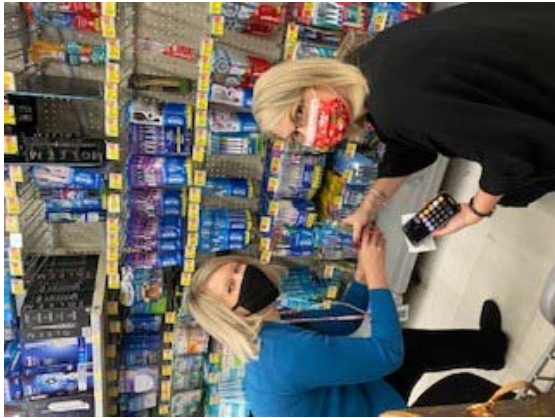

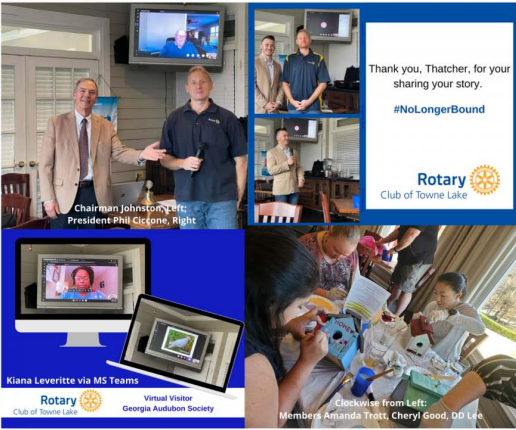

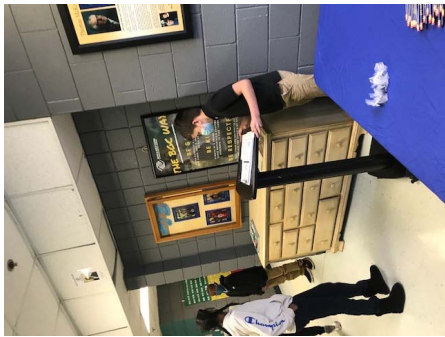

## Let's Talk Zones -- Part II

This month we are continuing our overview of Rotary Zones with part two. Last month, former Rotary International Director (2018-20), David Stovall, provided an excellent overview of structure and how zones fit in the overall hierarchy. This month, another past R.I. Director (2002-04), J. David Roper, will delve in more of an explanation of the purpose and function of the zones. Click read more for the details.

The RI Bylaws establish 34 zones which are composed of districts. For administrative purposes, zones are paired and share leadership and events. Our paired zones are Zones 33 and 34. The Georgia-South Carolina border divides Zone 33 on north from Zone 34 on the south. The RI board must review the composition of the zones at least every eight years to maintain an approximately equal number of Rotarians in each zone. So, what does a zone or pair of zones do?

A major function of zones is the election of directors of RI. There are 17 directors elected from zones who serve for two years. Zones 33 and 34 alternate electing a director. A director must be a past district governor. Representatives from each district in the zone comprise a nominating committee which selects a nominee for director. Clubs may nominate challenging candidates. The clubs in the zone then elect the person who will assume the office of director on July 1 about two years later.

Each year, the director of paired zones convenes a "zone institute" which is an informational, training and fellowship meeting for past, present, and future district governors. Currently, our institute is called a "Leader Summit." It is similar to a district conference with regard to information sharing and fellowship. And, training for incoming district governors is similar to the presidents-elect training seminar. In addition to the zone institute, directors often organize zone specialty training sessions for district leaders engaged in TRF activities, membership development, public image, etc. A zone institute is usually attended by the president or president-elect of RI and a trustee of TRF.

Each zone has a cadre of advisors to assist clubs and districts, including, Rotary Coordinators and assistant coordinators (specializing in membership and club development), Rotary Public Image Coordinators and assistant coordinators, Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinators and assistant coordinators, End Polio Now Coordinators, and various other advisors.
