For over 20 years, Tina has been enabling programs around the world to maximize impact and reach out to those most in need. A native of Reidsville, Georgia, USA. She attended Georgia Southern University. After graduation, she moved to Atlanta and with Coldwell Banker Lake Oconee Realty serving the Lake Oconee area. In addition, she continues to operate Barefoot Mountain Farms providing Fraser fir Christmas trees and greenery to schools and civic clubs throughout the Southeast. An advocate for reforestation she established the DavisHollcroft Family Forestry Scholarship at the University of Georgia. This scholarship is presented annually to a student studying at UGA s Warnell School of Forestry & Natural Resources.

Her volunteer work with organizations across the globe addresses the need for clean water, disease prevention, health care and literacy projects. In 2008, Tina joined Alliance for Smiles, a Rotary founded volunteer-based nonprofit, mobilizing hundreds of medical and non-medical volunteers from all over the world. Their work advances health care, trains local medical professional, and delivers surgical care for patients with cleft lip and cleft palate in their communities.

Tina is a proud member of the Rotary Club of Greene & Putnam Counties where she served as Club President in 2011-12 and currently serves as the clubs International Service Co-Chair. Active at the District Level, she has served on the finance committee, Assistant Governor and the District so International Service Chair. She is a graduate of the Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI), a Major Donor, a GRSP Will Watt Fellow, a Benefactor, a member of the Bequest Society and Paul Harris Society.

Tina received Rotary s highest honor, the Service Above Self an international award which recognizes less than 150 individuals annually who demonstrate their commitment to helping others.

Tina is married to Mike Fischlin, a former Major League baseball player who continues to live his passion as a sports agent with the Boras Corporation. In her spare time, she enjoys running, golf, spending time with family and friends and serving in her community and around the world. Tina, Mike and their dog, Sophia Loren reside in Greensboro, Georgia.

WGHS grad sparks water project in South Pacific, Rotarians unite for cause

An elementary school on an island in the South Pacific now has a supply of clean water thanks to the efforts of a Webster Groves High School graduate and the generosity of the Rotary Club of Webster Groves.

Although its meetings have been virtual over the past year, the Rotary Club of Webster Groves has managed to carry out Rotary International s global mission of service above self at home and abroad.

In 2020, the Rotary Club of Webster Groves funded a total of \$5,600 for three desperately needed water tanks for an elementary school in the Kingdom of Tonga. The club collaborated with the Tonga Rotary Club of Nuku�alofa to complete the project in the Village of Houma, which is located on one of the 169 islands comprising the Polynesian archipelago of Tonga.

The international project came about at the request of Lonita Benson, a 2014 graduate of Webster Groves High School, who was serving in Houma with the Peace Corps. Benson joined the Peace Corps after graduating from Mizzou in 2018 with a degree in International Studies and an emphasis in peace studies. She suspects she was assigned to Tonga because her mother had been born there; her parents met in Tonga when her father arrived as a Peace Corps volunteer during the 1980s.

Benson soon found herself teaching school in Houma, which had the lowest standardized test scores in all of Tonga. Although Houma so Government Primary School had two water tanks in their compound, only one of them stored potable water. Because the students lacked a sufficient supply of clean water, classes were frequently dismissed after lunch, and the 50 children were sent home.

It wasn to long before Benson realized that closing the school in the afternoon was a primary reason for the poor scholastics, so she decided to do something about it. After attending several grant writing workshops, she prepared and submitted more than a dozen grant applications to fund the needed tanks, but all were denied.

When she then reached out to the Rotary Club of Nuku�alofa, members suggested that she contact the rotary club in her hometown of Webster Groves. Benson�s email to the Rotary Club of Webster Groves resulted in two serendipitous relationships, and shortly thereafter, the project between the two clubs.

The webmaster of Webster sclub put Benson in touch with Steve LaBarge, who had watched her grow up at Annunciation Church in Webster. LaBarge then introduced her to Rod Cooper, whose wife had been a peace Corps volunteer in Tonga years before

Both members of the Webster club s International Projects Committee, LaBarge and Cooper presented the idea of helping out with the Tonga water tank project at the club s board meeting in November 2019. The Rotary Club of Webster Groves in January 2020 then approved \$2,500 to fund the first 12,000-liter tank. Cooper immediately contacted the Rotarians in Nuku alofa, who agreed to oversee all operational aspects associated with purchasing and installing the tanks.

Following the successful installation of the first tank, the Rotary Club of Webster Groves sent \$3,100 to the Rotary Club of Nuku�alofa in December 2020 for two additional 5,000-liter tanks.

The three new tanks have a total capacity of 22,000 liters. Although their primary role is to collect and store rain water for the school, any surplus water can also be used to augment the existing tanks serving the village, which has a population of roughly 250 people.

After the first tank sinstallation was underway in January 2020, Benson decided to take some vacation time to go backpacking in California. It was during that trip, however, that she learned her mother, Elitisi, was very ill with an unknown infection. Benson then flew home to Webster Groves to be with her mother, who was diagnosed with COVID-19 and died in April. Elitisi Benson was a teacher s aid for several years at the Walter Ambrose Family Center preschool in Webster Groves.

Benson still has about a year left in her Peace Corps stint, but hasn♦t been allowed to return to Tonga due to COVID-19 travel restrictions. She so been living in Breckenridge, Colorado, for the past six months and working remotely for St. Louis-based Civitas, a nonprofit that is best known for its Model UN program.

She is scheduled to start law school at Loyola of Chicago this fall, and has plans to attend Loyola s campus in Rome next spring.

♦If she ever returns to Houma, she will find the three water tanks she worked so diligently to secure, ♦ said Ann McReynolds, current public relations chair for the Rotary Club of Webster Groves. ♦Hopefully, she will also find the children in school for the entire day!

Founded in 1924, the Rotary Club of Webster Groves is the oldest Rotary Club in St. Louis County and one of 35,000 clubs worldwide. The 62 club members take pride in their volunteer work both here and abroad, raising funds primarily through the club s pancake festivals and trivia nights. Although the club s in-person meetings are still on hold, members continue to meet virtually and look forward to when they can resume lunch meetings at Webster Groves Presbyterian Church.

Rwamagana: Rotary Club donates to vulnerable children

A total of 1,500 vulnerable children aged between 7 and 12 in the Eastern Province have been given mattresses, bedsheets and school materials by Rotary Club Kigali Virunga.

The donation was made on Sunday, March 28.

The event was also attended by the Ambassador of the United States to Rwanda, Peter Vrooman, who is also a Rotarian.

The materials were donated by Sleeping Children Around the World, a Canadian organisation, and distributed in partnership with Rotary Club Kigali Virunga.

The kits provided include mattress, blankets, bedsheets, basin, school uniforms, notebooks, shoes, bags, facemasks and underwear.

♦When my daughter told me about it, she was happy and she asked me to come here to collect the kits. The materials we received are important to my daughters' studies and wellbeing. I usually buy school uniforms once every three years, it was just not easy. We thank the donors,♦ declared Salaama Bigenimana, a mother.

She added that when one offers a helping hand to someone they boost their confidence.

♦The items will improve our hygiene,♦ Christine Mukagasana, from Karutimbo Village, Cyanya Cell, Kigabiro Sector.

Jennifer Ingabire, former president of Rotary Club Kigali Virunga, explained that while she was president of Rotary Club, a Canadian organisation named Sleeping Children Around the World asked them to work with them as overseas volunteering partner in the distribution of the materials to children.

Rotary Club is an international organisation founded in 1905 with purpose to bring together business and professional leaders to provide humanitarian service

Among notable achievements of the organisation in Rwanda are Kigali Public Library and shelters for cancer patients established at Rwanda Military Hospital in Kigali.

There are five Rotary clubs in Rwanda, with each club having between 20-30 members on average.

As someone who knows firsthand the great leadership potential of Rotaractors, I always look forward to World Rotaract Week, which we are celebrating from 8 to 14 March. Rotaractors are the focus of all three of my presidential conferences this year, and I was proud when, two years ago, the Council on Legislation voted to elevate Rotaract by including Rotaract clubs as members of Rotary International. Before that, the Council had already made dual membership possible, and shortly after, the Board of Directors decided to do away with Rotaract sage limits.

But we are only just embarking on our journey together. Partnering effectively doesn thappen by itself. It requires both sides to be open and to understand the value of cross-generational alliances. Louie De Real, a dual member of Rotaract and Rotary, explains.

Joint virtual meetings have helped Rotaractors introduce Rotarians to new ideas and tools, pioneering unique ways for clubs to collaborate. In the case of pandemic and disaster response, Rotaract clubs used social media to coordinate efforts, drive information, and fundraise, while Rotary clubs used their networks and resources to amplify support, provide logistics, and bring the goods and services to communities.

Rotaractors innovative virtual engagement and professional development activities inspired Rotarians to support and follow suit. The pandemic made Rotaract clubs realize that we can immediately connect and partner with Rotary clubs through virtual platforms. With constant collaboration, we realize that Rotary and Rotaract indeed complement each other § that we are part of a single organization with shared goals.

Both sides add value. Rotarians can be mentors and service partners to Rotaractors, while Rotaractors can demonstrate to Rotarians that difficult jobs can be simplified and limitations can be surpassed through digital approaches. This synergy motivates Rotaractors to become future Rotarians: I joined Rotary because Rotarians gave me memorable membership experiences through inspirational moments of collaboration. I needed to be a Rotarian to inspire Rotaractors the same way, now and in the future.

That same synergy leads Rotarians to realize that while Rotaractors may have a different culture, we all share a common vision of uniting people to take action. Rotaractos unique ways of doing things serve as inspiration for innovation, helping Rotary increase its ability to adapt to future challenges. Rotarians and Rotaractors will build the future together, so letos start today.

I see no difference between a Rotary club and a Rotaract club, except perhaps for the average age!

Many Rotarians still view Rotaract as our youth organization, but I see it differently. For me, they are part of us, and they are like us. To be successful together, we need to have mutual respect \diamond to see each other as equals. Let \diamond s see Rotaractors for who they really are: students and young leaders, but also successful managers and entrepreneurs who are capable of planning, organizing, and managing a Rotary institute \diamond including breakout sessions in five languages \diamond as they did in Berlin in 2014.

As we take this journey together, let s remember the strengths of Rotary and Rotaract. And, as Louie says, let s get started right away in building the future together. In doing so, we open endless opportunities for our organization.
