

Trout are growing large for Rotary's first youth fishing day on May 25

Touring the trout pens that were erected at the end of last year, Rotary Club members got a closeup look at the success of their project seeing triploid rainbow trout that have gained three pounds and are now up to 16 to 18 inches long.

The Mount Shasta Rotary club is making a dream come true with their trophy-size trout program at Lake Siskiyou.

Touring the trout pens that were erected at the end of last year, Rotary Club members got a closeup look at the success of their project seeing triploid rainbow trout that have gained three pounds and are now up to 16 to 18 inches long.

Rotary Project Manager Tom Stienstra said that this came about as an idea at a party.

◆We will be releasing the fish during the beginning of May for a youth fishing day on May 25. This is a world chance experience without going to Alaska to catch three to five-pound wild rainbow trout. If we can do this here, we can do this throughout California.◆

And Emmy award winning writer, Stienstra will be donating 100 copies of his latest book, ◆Moon West Coast RV Camping◆ through the Boys & Girls Club for the Youth Fishing Day, when they will be busing in children for this special event.

There are three pens, each 10 feet deep and 12 feet long providing a large quality volume for optimal fish growth. Each pen is equipped with battery-powered feeders that automatically feed the fish three to five times a day.

Because these trout are ◆triploids,◆ they cannot breed, and in turn, grow faster ◆ about an inch per month and will take on the characteristics of wild fish.

According to Stienstra, the mortality rate has been less than 1 percent. The pens, designed and fabricated by Greg Juell, are predator proof.

◆Next year we will fine tune the pens. We want fishing to be great again for big fish at Lake Siskiyou and we know how to make that happen,◆ Stienstra said. ◆We will provide a pamphlet and booklet for anyone who wants to replicate this program.◆


More than 40 groups, businesses and individuals are partnering with Rotarian volunteers for the project, including the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors, Sousa Ready Mix, Campbell Global, Lake Siskiyou Marina, Kokanee Power, and Gary Bechtel with Foothill Foundation.

The project was structured to be sustainable and received no negative filings from CEQA. There was no profit involved and no fish were taken away from local programs. These fish were trucked in from the Crystal Hatchery at Baum Lake.

◆This is another example of Rotary being involved with other things in the community that people don't realize,◆ said Rotarian Doug Carter.

Cooperstown Rotary to raffle Hall ball featuring DiMaggio autograph

ContributedThe baseball to be raffled by the Cooperstown Rotary Foundation is from the National Baseball Hall of Fame's 1983 induction dinner. It is signed by 24 inductees, but only four of them are still alive.

With the National Baseball Hall of Fame beginning the "Yankee years" with the 2019 induction of Mariano Rivera, this year's Cooperstown Rotary Foundation's Amazing Autographed Baseball Raffle has an appropriate headline signature: New York Yankee legend Joe DiMaggio.

"What's interesting is there are 10 or 11 baseballs and they are all from different years," said Jeff Katz, the former mayor of Cooperstown and a longtime Rotary Club of Cooperstown member who helps run the baseball raffle every year. "We thought we'd start with the Ted Williams ball (which was auctioned last year), and with this year being Mariano Rivera, we thought we'd go with DiMaggio."

The cache of signed baseballs was donated by Rotary member Tom Heitz, who worked for more than a decade at the Hall, and had a signed ball from induction events from 1983 to 1992.

This year's baseball is from the 1983 induction of Brooks Robinson, Juan Marichal, Walter Alston and George Kell. Alston did not sign the ball for some unknown reason, but it does feature signatures from DiMaggio, Robinson, Kell and Marichal, as well as 21 other Hall of Famers: Burleigh Grimes, Johnny Mize, Buck Leonard, Monte Irvin, Robin Roberts, Bob Feller, Warren Spahn, Billy Herman, Bill Dickey, Sandy Koufax, Luke Appling, Judy Johnson, Al Kaline, Al Lopez, Charlie Gehringer, Cool Papa Bell, Joe Cronin, Duke Snider, Joe Sewell and Ralph Kiner.

Only four of the players who signed the ball, Robinson, Marichal, Koufax and Kaline, are still alive.

Katz said he is always fascinated to look at the signature baseballs and imagine the Hall of Fame banquets where they were signed.

"I think it gives it a lot of character," he said. "It gives a glimpse of them as a group. It is like a little slice of baseball history."

Only 100 tickets will be sold. Tickets cost \$50 each. The money goes to the CRF, the 501(c)3 division of the Rotary Club, and helps fund the group's scholarships and other charitable activities.


"Raffles are fun, and if you win, you win," Katz said. "It is a gift to the foundation, because you can always buy an autographed baseball somewhere. But with the DiMaggio signature on it, we think this year's ball is special."

The drawing will take place Tuesday, July 30. Tickets will be available at the Rotary Spring Fling, which will be Saturday, May 18 at The Clark Sports Center in the town of Middlefield. Sales will continued until all 100 tickets are sold or until the July 30 drawing.
