President Stephanie was back after an anniversary vacation. She rang the bell to start the meeting and reminded us of our club's 109 years of service. After thanking Jackie for her piano playing, she called on Ivey Hall to lead the song and pledge. Ivey chose perennial favorite *God Bless America*, and President Elect Rebecca Grist followed with a nice prayer.

Stephanie welcomed our guests, which included four students and one staff member from Middle Georgia State University who had come in support of our member and speaker, President Chris Blake.

She then offered birthday wishes to seven members celebrating January 23-31. There were two shared birthdays – George Jackson and Cater Thompson on January 25 and past President Jim Manley and Sarah Nicholls on January 31. There was just one club anniversary; Jeff Dudley now has 14 years of service.

It was then time for CART brags, in which we raise money to benefit Alzheimer's research. Only two came forward this time. President Stephanie led off by saying she just returned from a ski trip to Vail, Colorado, where she and her husband were married 17 years ago. They now go for each anniversary, and Stephanie was grateful that Past President Susan Welsh could fill in for her last week.





Stephanie then made two announcements on behalf of Matt Shoemaker. For those Rotarians with rising junior and senior high school students, The RYLA conference this year runs from Wednesday, June 12 through Saturday, June 15 and it offers an amazing and memorable time for the students who go. It consists of leadership seminars and programs offered by a wide spectrum of professionals. The cost is \$350 per student but our club will pay for up to four students. Also, we now have a date for the Speech Contest, and it will be March 2. Matt will have more information for us soon.

January is Rotary Vocational Month, and Charles Olson came up to share what our members are doing in the community. Standing in for Gary Wheat, Charles said Dr. Chris Blake, our speaker, awarded Robert Hatcher, Senior for his contributions to Middle Georgia State with the Board of Regents Hall of Fame Alumni and Distinguished Friends award. Members Seth Clark and Gary Wheat were recently featured on 41NBC

It was then time to induct our newest member, Charlotte Way. She is joining under the classification of Tax Attorney/Legal Counsel and is with the Mauldin & Jenkins CPA firm. Charlotte was introduced by President-Elect Rebecca Grist. Charlotte holds a B.S. in Accounting from the University of Louisiana and a J.D. from the University of Virginia School of Law, as well as an LL.M. in taxation from New York University School of Law. She holds admission to the bar in the States of Georgia and Texas. She's also a CPA in Georgia and moved back to Macon about a year ago. Welcome, Charlotte!



Our speaker was our member, Dr. Chris Blake, President of Middle
Georgia State University. He was introduced by Rebecca Grist, who noted that he has led the university
through significant growth since being named its first permanent President in 2014. It has expanded from a
bachelor's granting institution to one offering many master's degrees and two doctoral degrees as well.
Originally from Wimbledon, England, Dr. Blake holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Theology from the
University of Oxford, Keble College, a postgraduate certificate in education from Westminster College
(Oxford), and a Ph.D. in Education from King's College of the University of London. Beginning in the
classroom, he served in progressive positions within American higher education before joining Middle
Georgia State.

He is also author of two books that explore aspects of World War I history, and was among the 2022 Georgia Writers Association's nominees for Author of the Year for his second book, *Reckless Misfortune: The Century We Inherited from the First World War.* He's also an enthusiastic fan of professional football (soccer), supporting Tottenham Hotspur of the English Premiere League.

Chris began by saying he was thrilled to be speaking here again, having addressed the club before on a number of topics, including Ukraine. He recognized the students in the audience, including two tennis players who came from Argentina and Germany. He said he's surrounded by amazing colleagues, and has recently welcomed Nancy White as Vice President of Advancement.

Middle Georgia State University (MGSU) now has 8,000 students from 144 of Georgia's 159 counties, 40 states and 73 countries. Eighty percent of graduates live and work within 100 miles of Macon. That means they are in our businesses and hospitals, and working with airlines in Atlanta and with Contour here in Macon.

MGSU is the most affordable public university in Georgia and four neighboring states, with a tuition rate of just \$150 per credit. They offer Georgia's flagship school of aviation, with a presence in Eastman and the Macon Downtown Airport. The nursing school is in Dublin. The first set of IT doctorates received their degrees last year. There are over 43,000 alumni worldwide.

The university now has approval to transition its athletes to NCAA Division II. In their philanthropy and foundation office the school has quietly raised \$9.2 million plus \$26 million of State money for capital projects. Every single day the institution receives \$12,000 in gifts. A \$500 gift can be the difference in graduating or not for a student.

Chris then told of the Center for Middle Georgia Studies. Starting with a \$1.2 million grant from the Peyton Anderson Foundation and \$1.1 million from the Carolyn Smalley estate the center plans to address real-life issues in Middle Georgia. On a smaller scale, this will be like the Fanning Institute or the Carl Vinson Institute offering strategic planning, budget analysis, and long-term projections of revenues and taxation for both local governments and institutions.

There is a new strategic plan called Middle Georgia's path to Excellence 2023-2028. Dr. Blake then highlighted some other programs of MGSU, which is on track to have over 8,700 students in the next five years. While Chris said he's been an itinerant around the world, this is now his home, and out home, and we will succeed. His talk solicited many questions from the members.

Excused Absences

Members have the opportunity to receive a board approved Excused Absence during a long-term family, health, or business crisis. When a member realizes they have a situation that will keep them from attending Monday meetings for an extended period they can contact the Club Administrator or President with the reason. This contact needs to be immediate and not after the crisis. The board can approve a beginning and ending date and attendance is excused on club and district level. Short term absences are best made up online.

Club Membership Applications

We are purpose-driven leaders of influence and action. To sponsor a prospective candidate to join our membership, contact Membership Chair Charles Olson <u>EOlson200@msn.com</u> or any member of the Board of Directors to ensure a vocational classification is available for your candidate.

Once the Classification Committee approves the classification, invite your new member candidate to a weekly meeting. If the candidate expresses interest in joining our club, then ask Membership Chair Charles to send the candidate an invitation to apply online. Once the new member candidate completes the application, Board members review the application. Then, new member candidates are presented for formal approval at the monthly Board meeting. Once approved by the Board, new member candidates are announced in Throbs. Unless there is objection by any existing member, the new member is scheduled for orientation and formal induction. All members of our club need to think about who would make good Rotarians!
