MEETING March 18, 2024

President Stephanie Folsom rang the bell to start the meeting and welcomed members and guests. After thanking pianist Jackie Riley, she asked Past President Albert Reichert to lead the singing and pledge.

Albert usually chooses something out of the ordinary, and today's selection was another treat. He said that yesterday was St. Patrick's Day and this week is Cherry Blossom and the theme of both is comradeship, so today's song was *Vive la Compagnie*. Members joined in singing the chorus "Vive la vive la vive l'amour, Vive la compagnie."

Gary Abbot offered a prayer about the gift of service and impact of Rotary in the community and the very far corners of the earth.

Stephanie then welcomed our many guests which included two guests of members, two students from FPD, and the Principal, College Counselor and one student from Tattnall Square, as well as our eight musicians.

Four members celebrate birthdays March 12-18, including Chris Blake whose birthday is today. Both Ashley McDaniel and Frank Wood celebrate their first anniversary with our club.

It was then time for CART brags, which benefit Alzheimer's research. We had some good ones!



Matt Shoemaker introduced our visiting STAR students. This week we had two schools represented – Tattnall Square Academy and First Presbyterian Day School, better known as FPD.

Our own John Patterson is Head of School for FPD, but he turned the mic over to Matt Kitchell, who is High School Principal. Matt said that Senior student Henry McClure is a man of humanities who will be going to Washington and Lee, while Faith McClure is more STEM-focused and will be entering Georgia Tech to study mathematics. Both students came up and spoke very highly of their experiences at FPD.

John Abernathy, Principal and coach at Tattnall Square, then introduced his student Anna Hilliard. Anna has been very active in many school clubs including one she founded on mental health awareness. She also plays basketball and was just named Homecoming Queen. She will be going to the University of Georgia in the fall.



President Stephanie then reminded the members we have two Service Projects coming up on the first and last Saturdays in April. The first, on April 6 from 9:30am to noon, is a Pleasant Hill Neighborhood Cleanup in conjunction with Keep Macon-Bibb Beautiful and Community Schools United. This takes place at the L.H. Williams Recreation Center, 325 Pursley Street, and lunch is offered to participants. You can sign up online or on the sign-up sheets available at this and subsequent meetings.

The second is our own club's workday with Rebuilding Macon. This year, we will be working Saturday, April 27. Two shifts are available – 8:00am to 11:30am and 11:30am-3:00pm. End times are approximate, and you can sign up to work either or both shifts. You are also welcome to drop by the

Finally, Stephanie said it's time for another special music program organized by George Lee. George then introduced the performers. The first was Harper McCoy, a harpist who is only 11, has been playing since she was four, and performed with the Atlanta Symphony at age seven. Harper performed *Valse in E-flat*, Opus 83 by Marie-Auguste Durand.

The club was next treated to selections by the Middle Georgia Flute Choir, which consists of six musicians plus conductor Bastien



Millo, who sometimes joins in to make it seven. The group performed nine pieces made popular by plays and films, beginning with the 1939 piece *Over the Rainbow*.





Other pieces included the popular *My Favorite Things*, *As Time Goes By*, and *Moon River*. The audience got to participate by snapping fingers to *The Adams Family*.

After a rousing applause, it was time for our raffle. Julie Petherbridge drew the winning ticket but picked the Jack of Spades, so the \$207 pot rolls over to next week.

HOW TO MAKE UP MISSED MEETINGS

Please make up missed meetings to help our club's attendance percentage rank with District 6920 and Rotary International. Our attendance is reported each month to the district and is required to be reported before the 15th of the following month. Members are encouraged to maintain an attendance average of 60%.

Missed meetings must be made up 14 days before or after the meeting you miss.

Also, attendance at another Rotary Club is a great option when you are traveling!

When you make up using the **Zoom link** of our meetings listed in meeting summary above or makeup in person at another club please send an email immediately afterwards to the Club Administrator, <u>steve@eggmedia.com</u> so your makeup can be recorded. Do not expect the club you visit to report to our club.

Excused Absences

Members have the opportunity to receive a board approved Excused Absence during a long-term family, health, or business crisis. When a member realizes they have a situation that will keep them from attending Monday meetings for an extended period they can contact the Club Administrator or President with the reason. This contact needs to be immediate and not after the crisis. The board can approve a beginning and ending date and attendance is excused on club and district level. Short term absences are best made up online.

Club Membership Applications

We are purpose-driven leaders of influence and action. To sponsor a prospective candidate to join our membership, contact Membership Chair Charles Olson EOlson200@msn.com or any member of the Board of Directors to ensure a vocational classification is available for your candidate.

Once the Classification Committee approves the classification, invite your new member candidate to a weekly meeting. If the candidate expresses interest in joining our club, then ask Membership Chair Charles to send the candidate an invitation to apply online. Once the new member candidate completes the application, Board members review the application. Then, new member candidates are presented for formal approval at the monthly Board meeting. Once approved by the Board, new member candidates are announced in Throbs. Unless there is objection by any existing member, the new member is scheduled for orientation and formal induction. All members of our club need to think about who would make good Rotarians!
