MEETING June 9, 2025

Attendance: 54.2% - 64 in person, 14 Zoom, plus 17 in-person guests and one Zoom guest Raffle \$155, CART \$29 Club Membership: 156

President Danny Gibson rang the bell to begin the meeting and then invited Past President Albert Reichert to lead the singing and pledge. As always, Albert found a lesser-known song, at least to us. He called on Past President Jonathan Alderman to help lead the singing. The song, *R-O-T-A-R-Y That Spells Rotary*, was copyrighted in 1923 by the Wilmington, Delaware Rotary Club, and is sung at club meetings all over the country. However, this may be the first time for our club. Thankfully, Albert provided the lyrics.



Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Past President Andy Nations offered the prayer. Andy asked for continued blessings for our club, and reminded us to be mindful of those less fortunate with whom we share this world.

President Danny thanked Albert, Jonathan, and Andy. He noted that he grew up in Tift County, and the local Rotary club there sang that song at every meeting. He thanked Jackie Riley for her piano playing, and also noted that Pearce Miller, our AV tech, played the piano some before the meeting and was very good.

Danny then addressed our speaker, Dr. Sumner, noting the large crowd she had drawn. With so many physicians in attendance, he noted, this would be a good time for someone to have a medical emergency. He noted that a member once collapsed years ago and was attended by a member physician, but it turned out the person had just fallen asleep.

Danny then welcomed our many guests, which included a large delegation from the Mercer School of Medicine and several potential members. Next, he noted members celebrating birthdays and club anniversaries. Past President Andy Nations had a birthday June 5, and tomorrow both Milton Heard and Cynthia Knapp celebrate. Frank Wood's birthday is June 13.

President Danny followed with club announcements. In two weeks, on June 23, President-Elect Rebecca Grist and her 2025-26 board will be sworn in. For that meeting, we won't meet at our usual place but will be down the street at Overlook on First in the old Armory building. More details will be in next week's *Throbs*.

Volunteers are still needed to work on the Habitat house our club is sponsoring to honor our late member Josh Rogers. Sign-up information can be found at the end of this newsletter.

Finally, there will be a dues increase of \$20/quarter, beginning in the new Rotary year July 1. This will bring quarterly dues to \$300, which is still a good value.

Danny then called on Program Chair Jimmy Asbell to introduce our speaker, Dean Jean Sumner. Jimmy said Dr. Jean Sumner is Dean of the Mercer University School of Medicine and a lifelong advocate for rural health care in Georgia. A third-generation Georgia physician, Dr. Sumner began her career serving in Washington and Johnson counties.

She joined Mercer in 1989 as a community faculty preceptor and became dean in 2016 after holding a series of leadership roles. Her career includes service as a hospital chief of staff, nursing home medical director, and leadership on numerous professional boards, including as President and Medical Director of the Georgia Composite Medical Board.

Dr. Sumner was the first Georgian to receive the Ralph O. Claypool, Sr. Memorial Award from the American College of Physicians, where she is also a Fellow. She earned her nursing degrees from the Medical College of Georgia and her M.D. from Mercer, completing her internal medicine residency right here in Macon.

"I'm particularly happy to introduce her today because she's not only a friend with whom I've worked with closely, but she's my son, Jimmy's dean."

Dean Sumner then took to the podium. The following is a condensed version of her remarks, for the full program see <u>https://tinyurl.com/222knxn9</u>.

When Mercer School of Medicine was founded in 1982, its mission was clear: to train doctors who would serve Georgia's rural and medically underserved communities. Dean Jean Sumner shared how Mercer is delivering on that promise, and doing so with bold innovation and measurable results.

Georgia has 120 rural counties, and 65 of them have no pediatrician. For many families, a simple checkup requires a drive of 40, 50, or 60 miles. Parents often have to choose between gas, groceries, and medicine. Mercer is changing that reality by recruiting students from rural communities, educating them close to home, and helping them return to serve the places they came from.

One key initiative is the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta Scholars program, which now supports 28 students. Another is the Nathan Deal Scholars Program, launched during Dean Sumner's first week, with a \$35 million endowment from the state. The fund has now provided full-tuition scholarships to 113 students who pledge to practice in rural areas, over \$11 million in support since 2011.



Mercer also created the country's first accelerated primary care track, where qualified students can complete medical school in three years and enter a pre-matched residency program with no tuition after year one. Programs in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, and now psychiatry ensure graduates are prepared to serve where they're most needed.

Beyond education, Mercer operates six rural clinics, strategically placed in counties where no other providers go. These clinics are not built to compete; they're built to fill gaps. The Plains clinic, inspired

by a call from President Jimmy Carter himself, stands as a shining example. Today, it serves patients in a once-vacant lime green building, and continued to get the occasional quality-control call from President Carter until his recent passing.

Mission

To educate physicians and health professionals to meet the primary care and health care needs of rural medically underserved areas of Georgia.



Other projects include:

- A new Mercer Center for IDD Care in Macon, a state-funded 34,000-square-foot facility providing coordinated care—including dental and diagnostic services—for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Mercer will also train physicians and dentists in this often-overlooked specialty.

- A partnership with Marcus Autism Center to pilot 10-minute autism screenings in rural counties using iPad-based technology backed by Arthur Blank.

- An opioid prevention initiative, training "life care specialists" through technical colleges, in partnership with the Christopher Wolf Crusade and tested in five rural counties.

- The Kids Alliance for Better Care, equipping rural hospitals and schools in 23 counties with tools like infant warmers, telehealth tech, and mental health screening for students. In one case, the alliance helped a South Georgia hospital that delivered babies without even having a baby scale.

Dr. Sumner closed with a powerful reminder: "We're short of physicians in Georgia, and really short in rural areas. But I believe we're solving that problem. We're helping these kids become really good doctors. And we're helping them go back home."

Dean Sumner's speech was greatly appreciated by the members, who stayed long after the meeting to continue the conversation. When her speech ended, it was time to have out lottery drawing in which half of the pot goes to the winner and the other half to the CART fund. The pot was up to \$3,043 with only five cards left in the deck. Past President Don Cornett, who only recently rejoined our club, had the winning ticket. Then, it was...

Excused Absences

Members have the opportunity to receive a board approved Excused Absence during a long-term family, health, or business crisis.
