
Albert Reichert then came up to introduce our speaker, Gordon Rogers. Gordon is the Flint Riverkeeper and has deep roots in central and South Georgia. He previously worked with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources and was the Satilla Riverkeeper before being Flint Riverkeeper. He's also been a professional fisherman, so is one who appreciates rivers and natural resources.

He said the first organization to use the Riverkeeper name was organized in the mid-1960's to address problems of New York's Hudson River. At the time, the river was dying from pollution and neglect and had been written off. An unlikely alliance of conservative politicians, fishermen and other blue-collar workers, and bluebloods who had estates up the river, came together to stop the river from being dammed. Their continued efforts led to the cleanup and revitalization of the Hudson. The nation became more aware of the urgent need to protect waterways and the Clean Water Act passed in 1962 despite President Nixon's veto.

The Flint Riverkeeper dates to just 2008, when a small group of concerned citizens came together to address the declining state of that river. On June 27, 2008, at the final night of Paddle Georgia 2008, a week-long canoe/kayak camping excursion on the Flint River, it was announced that the Flint Riverkeeper was officially formed and approved. President Jimmy Carter was on hand to address the crowd about his work to keep the Flint River from being dammed in the 1970s. At that time, a board member made a \$10,000 Founding Member donation in honor of Pres. Carter and a kayak donated to the organization was presented, as well.

Today, Gordon spends much of his time at the State Legislature, though he said that's not his favorite part. Most companies and municipalities can be persuaded to mount cleanup efforts with just the suggestion that Flint Riverkeeper may bring a lawsuit, since the organization is known to be serious. A good example of these efforts is the multimillion-dollar effort by the City of Albany to clean up their water system. In all, over \$250 million has been voluntarily invested by various entities in flow improvements to the Flint River.

Gordon said all rivers have flow problems. When they touch more than one state, it can lead to contentious lawsuits, the major example being the Florida-Georgia dispute. You can learn much more at flintriverkeeper.org.

HOW TO MAKE UP MISSED MEETINGS

Please make up missed meetings to help our club's attendance percentage rank with District 6920 and Rotary International. Our attendance is reported each month to the district and is required to be reported before the 15th of the following month. **Members are required to maintain an attendance** average of 60%.

Missed meetings must be made up 14 days before or after the meeting you miss.

You can make up from the comfort of your home or office online at http://rotaryeclubone.org/ They will email a notice of the makeup to the Club Administrator and you will be credited. Also, attendance at another Rotary Club is a good option when you are traveling!

When you make up using the **Zoom link** of our meetings listed in meeting summary above or makeup in person at another club please send an email immediately afterwards to the Club Administrator, steve@eggmedia.com so your makeup can be recorded. Do not expect the club you visit to report to our club.

Excused Absences

Members have the opportunity to receive a board approved Excused Absence during a long-term family, health, or business crisis. When a member realizes they have a situation that will keep them from attending Monday meetings for an extended period they can contact the Club Administrator or President with the reason. This contact needs to be immediate and not after the crisis. The board can approve a beginning and ending date and attendance is excused on club and district level. Short term absences are best made up online.

Club Membership Applications

We are purpose-driven leaders of influence and action. To sponsor a prospective candidate to join our membership, contact Membership Chair Ethiel Garlington egarlington@historicmacon.org or any member of the Board of Directors to ensure a vocational classification is available for your candidate. Once the Classification Committee approves the classification, invite your new member candidate to a weekly meeting. If the candidate expresses interest in joining our club, then ask Membership Chair Ethiel to send the candidate an invitation to apply online. Once the new member candidate completes the application, Board members review the application. Then, new member candidates are presented for formal approval at the monthly Board meeting. Once approved by the Board, new member candidates are announced in Throbs. Unless there is objection by any existing member, the new member is scheduled for orientation and formal induction. All members of our club need to think about who would make good Rotarians!
