It was a little chilly for those who dressed to remain inside, and chairs near the edge were damp with dew.

Teresa Cordova O'Dea spoke about the roads diverging, Kert Rhodes led the *Pledge* and Prez Mark called attention to the Aquaman article in this month's *Rotarian*.

Priscilla Hoag was first with the happy buck as she gave Publix a thank you for running BOGO on Skippy peanut butter. Better rush out because it ends today. Edie Wiseman made a \$10 pledge because she and her husband received their 2nd vaccines yesterday. Sherrie Davis Kinkead was happy to receive a Tee Sign Sponsorship from Dave Gehris, who upped the donation by \$25 if he could have The 4-Way Test on his sign (Dave, we want The 5-Way Test—let's not leave out, "Is it FUN?") Sgt-at-Arms Pat Snair collected PB&J donations for Dunedin Cares at her office, Back "N" Balance, from Teresa and Doug Campbell. Infectious disease doctor, Ulyee Choe, also a Gator fan and DHS alumnus, gave the timeline of Covid-19 in the world, our state, and our county, along with current positivity rates. Covid-19 has caused a 16.5% rise in the mortality rate, if not directly, then indirectly as people failed to get medical help for other conditions or from suicide. An interesting statistic is that 95% of doctors opt to be vaccinated, 54% of nurses do, but only 35% front line workers want the vaccine. Dr. Choe feels we will need booster shots to help with the variants to counteract the decreased effectiveness of the current vaccines. An oral antibiotic is now in the pipeline. He hopes 60%-70% of our population either get vaccinated or have antibodies in order to achieve herd immunity.

The World Is Still Battling Polio. What That Warning Means for Covid-19.

ESHAWAR, Pakistan—Decades of work brought the world close to ending polio, but misinformation, religious beliefs and economic

grievances have fueled resistance to inoculations. After decades of work, polio had been wiped out almost everywhere in the world. All that was left were pockets in Afghanistan and Pakistan. Medical experts hoped 2020 would be the last year that the main form of the virus, which can permanently paralyze or cause death, posed a threat.

The coronavirus pandemic put a halt to that progress.

In March, house-to-house vaccination teams working across Pakistan were forced to stop their work because of Covid-19. As a result, polio resurged, including a mutated form of the virus. It has now been detected in samples taken from sewers in 74% of Pakistan in late 2020, up from just 13% in early 2018.

"Now the virus isn't just in select pockets. The risk is everywhere" in the country, said Rana Safdar, the doctor in charge of Pakistan's polio campaign.

How has the novel coronavirus disease pandemic affected anti-polio efforts in Nigeria?

Tunji Funsho, a Lagos-based cardiologist who chairs Rotary's Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, for eradicating polio in Africa's most populous country answers the question:

While mass polio immunization campaigns were temporarily paused everywhere

in March in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, efforts resumed across Africa (as well as in Pakistan and Afghanistan) in July.

As campaigns resumed, safeguards were put in place to ensure that health workers could deliver immunizations safely and would not contribute to the spread of COVID-19.

Nevertheless, even as Rotary and its GPEI partners remain focused on polio eradication, the GPEI's Polio Oversight Board announced it is extending previous support to the next phase of the coronavirus pandemic — vaccine introduction and delivery — and so too will Rotary.

Rotary will take a proactive approach as its members become involved in this phase, at the local club level.

Specifically, Rotary International President Holger Knaack and The Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair KR "Ravi" Ravindran formed a COVID-19 response task force and are calling on Rotary's 36,000 clubs around the world to connect with their local health authorities to ask how they can best support community COVID-19 vaccination or preparedness efforts.

Rotary and its GPEI partners have a moral obligation to leverage our knowledge and success in polio eradication as the world faces the worst pandemic in a century.

Even as we lend our tools, knowledge, and polio infrastructure to assist with COVID-19 response efforts, we must remain laserfocused on meeting the remaining challenges to a polio-free world.

COVID-19 is a setback to the last mile of polio eradication just as the 2016 Borno State wild poliovirus outbreak was a setback to the certification of the WHO African region. Together, we must end the pandemic, then put the full weight of our expertise and resources towards ending polio for good.

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
