photos can be shared between members.

PDG Tim Schuler gave a review of the Council on Legislation held in April where only 32 submissions were approved. One question arose on how to vet a potential member proposed by a member in another club if no one knows the proposed member. Another that affects all members is a dues increase of \$4 yearly beginning in July 2023, then \$3.50 per year in 2024 and again in 2025. So our total RI yearly dues per member for 2022-23 will be \$71, then \$75, then \$78.50, then \$82. The Rotarian magazine adds another \$12 and insurance adds approximately \$6 per person. Positive Peace was added to our Avenues of Service (Club, Vocational, Community, International, Youth).

Look for more events that need venues like this to be held at the Pasco-Hernando State College. It's worth the drive.
