The announcement will be in the Tampa Bay Times on Sunday, with a memorial service planned later. Dick hosts a yearly golf tournament and this year, it will be known as the Brian Spong Memorial Tournament to be held this winter.

FL MINUTE W/DR. BILL: Sand Mountain, FL, composed of a pile of sand from mining processes, was in two locations: Polk County and the Panhandle. Bill showed a picture of skiers heading down the sand, Florida-style.

A favorite spot near Fort Meade in the 1940s through the 1960s was Sand Mountain. It was a huge sand pile created by Swift and Company from the washings of phosphate rock. The pile of sand grew to be 200 feet tall. The consistency of the sand made it ideal for skiing.

Dick Pope, the founder of Cypress Gardens, organized the Florida Downhill Sand-Skiing Association. There were actually sand skiing tournaments here with teams from all over the world competing for the championship. Locals used to ski down the hill, slide on sleds and toboggans, pieces of cardboard or whatever was handy. Some folks even slid down the hill on water skis. People loved to climb the mountain and have picnics up on the top.

The end of Sand Mountain came in the 1960s when new technology allowed the phosphate companies to extract more phosphate from the sand hill. Down it came, but it's still a fond memory to many folks from Polk County. You can still drive Sand Mountain road south of town.

- PREVENT AND TREAT DISEASE. Rotary clubs around the world strengthen communities by keeping them healthy. Clubs in the U.S. states of Wisconsin and Minnesota obtained a mobile clinic that provides free services for people without health insurance. In Korea, Rotary clubs assist cyclists who have partial or complete vision loss.
- ENCOURAGE EDUCATION. The Guatemala Literacy Project has worked for decades to improve literacy rates and keep children in school.
