

-OUR VISION-

Our vision is to cultivate a social, fun and inclusive Rotary club where every member feels valued and motivated to drive meaningful change and be a cornerstone of service, locally and globally.

Did You Know? PHF Clubs Explained...

Our Rotary club has two "clubs" to encourage donations to The Rotary Foundation (TRF). The \$1/Month Club requires a member to pay \$12 (\$1/month) on the first dues invoice. Then 12 names are drawn (one for each month), with the winners receiving \$100 sent to TRF in their name. Originally, names were drawn each month but more recently, all 12 are drawn at the same time. The PHF club requires a member to pay \$120, broken up into three payments of \$40/quarter on the first three dues invoices. Each participant is guaranteed \$100 being send to TRF in their name. For approximately every 10 participants, a name is drawn that receives \$1000 rather than \$100. For those who are mathematically-minded, you know that money in will not equal money out. The club picks up the difference, which comes from our fundraising activities and/or the 50-50 Drawing. All donations to TRF attributed to a member's name will be tax deductible for that member and TRF will send a letter thanking the member for their donation.

Why do we care about encouraging donations to TRF?

Money sent in from the clubs can be designated for several Foundation programs. Generally, the donations from our PHF clubs are designated for the Annual Fund SHARE Program, which is the only fund that returns 50% of the money given by the members in a district to that district three years later to use for matching grants and activities (25% locally and 25% internationally). But if a winner or participant prefers, they can designate one of the other programs: PolioPlus, a specific international grant, World Fund, Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment, Water and Sanitation, Maternal and Child Health, Basic Education and Literacy, or Economics and Community Development. So the more we donate now, the more the clubs in our district will have for local projects and international grants three years later.

Why do we call them PHF clubs?

When donors give to TRF, they receive a point for every dollar given. To honor the founder of Rotary, Paul Harris, TRF designates a donor who has 1000 points as a Paul Harris Fellow. That is why we call our club that awards the winners \$1000 a PHF club. TRF also designates donors who give \$100/year as sustaining members. That is why we decided winners of the \$1/Month Club receive \$100, which gives them a sustaining membership.

What happens when members donate more than \$1000?

When members accumulate points, they can "give" them away to someone who has not achieve PHF status. Or for each 1000 points above their first 1000, the donor can designate anyone they choose as a PHF. Spouses and children are often chosen. Sometimes, a person who has made a difference in the donor's life is chosen. Or perhaps they want to recognize a new member who embodies Service Above Self by making them a PHF. Clubs and district also accumulate points and often use the points to match cash donations for those who have not achieved a PHF. When a member gives their points away, they still receive the recognition based on their donations. Pins are given, with stones designating the level of giving (\$2000: 1 sapphire - \$6999: 5 sapphires; \$7000: 1 ruby - \$9999: 3 rubies). A diamond is given at the \$10,000 level and the donor becomes known as a Major Donor.

In addition, donors can commit to giving \$1000 yearly and belong to the Paul Harris Society. Other recognitions include a gift or bequest of \$1000+ to the Endowment Fund to be designated as a Benefactor or \$10,000+ to belong to the Bequest Society.

PROGRAM: Blair Kline, the general manager of the Dunedin Golf Club, talked about the renovation of the Donald Ross course. Donald Ross was one of the top architects of golf courses with 415 in play at one time. He rewarded strategy and built his greens accordingly. Dunedin's course improvements include a new sprinkler system, TifTuf Bermuda grass, which holds color longer and is drought tolerant, removal of dead and invasive trees and relocation of existing trees and new trees. The work needed is on schedule for a November 1 reopening.
