An Exceptional Service for an Exceptional Woman



Saturday, August 26, a memorial service was held at the Unitarian Universalist Church for Lynne Edelman Faimalie. Lynne's impact on those she knew and loved extended widely. Those who came to remember and celebrate Lynne were a diverse crowd: Black, Hispanic, white, young, old, siblings, students, children of friends, teachers, cruise mates and Rotarians. Mark, her son, spoke first about Lynne's support and guidances, being not only a mother but his best friend. He remembered that she spent every night in the hospital by his side while undergoing chemo and radiation for her breast cancer when he broke his leg in

several places at age 12. When doctors told him he would never run again, Lynne was there, encouraging him with each step until he proved them wrong. Her half-brother told about Lynne moving to Houston so she could be near and help her mother and step-family after her mother was diagnosed with cancer until she died 4 years later. Lynne showed up with food or drove friends to appointments without being asked. When her graduating class of Clearwater High 1968 met for their 30th reunion planning, she suggested rather than celebrating high school accomplishments and accolades that they create a scholarship fund to help future graduates from Clearwater High, and since then, over \$20,000 in scholarships have been awarded. Her former husband, Lance, and Mark's father told the story of meeting Lynne in New Zealand and 7 months later, when Lynne was returning to the US, she asked him if he would come to the US and marry her. About a month later, he received a large envelope with three inner envelopes. The first held a work VISA. The second a flight ticket to the US. The third was a wedding announcement of their marriage, which would take place at the Unitarian church we were in today. As Lance said, American women don't mess around! Then he sang a song Lynne aways requested that he sing to her, Elvis' Can't Help Falling in Love, which brought tears to many eyes. A principal who was with the school system for 33 years told how she encouraged him to go back to school so he could teach when he expressed that he wanted a change. This editor thought of Lynne's stories about giving treats to the attendants and pilots on flights, and most recently, when extremely sick from chemo, Lynne took donuts to the medical staff when receiving IV fluids. Story after story about Lynne's kindness, encouragement and guiding light was told.

Back in April, Lynne designated four new PHFs with points she had earned. Melissa, Mark's wife, and their children, Ava and AJ, were recipients along with a friend named Karen Glidden. Sherrie went with the mission of getting Mark's and Karen's emails so we could arrange a time to present the pin and certificates in a meaningful way. She saw Mark when walking into the service and was able to get his email. But not knowing what Karen looked like, she knew it may

be more difficult to find her. She was not one of the friends who spoke at the service, so Sherrie went to the Fellowship Hall hoping that someone could point her out. Recognizing one of the speakers, Sherrie headed that way but stopped due to the crowd. To make small talk with a woman standing near, Sherrie reported that she was on a mission for find someone. The woman said, "Who? Maybe I can help." When Sherrie replied with Karen's name, the woman said, "That's me." Sherrie admits it took about a minute before she could speak without crying, knowing Lynne was still directing everything for her friends. Lynne had contacted Karen about giving a program to our club and probably would have given her the PHF at that time. Sherrie promised to follow up on the program and any plane for PHF n

Dunedin Cares hires new executive director

According to the new executive director, the pantry has seen a significant increase in clients who have jobs but can't afford the high supermarket food prices, forcing the pantry to work harder to keep up its supply.

Board Meeting Notes from Aug. 23

Two members requested and were granted a leave of absence: Graham Muir, whose work commitments with Publix keeps him from attending regularly, and Ramon Garcia, who looks after an out-of-state relative. Amanda Dyer will change from an Active member to an Honorary member. Those on leave pay an amount that covers RI and district dues. Honorary members do not pay dues nor have rights of Rotary membership but are expected to help with service projects and fundraisers. Both pay meals when they are able to attend. Sherrie Davis Kinkead will be acting secretary until a permanent replacement can be found for Ramon.

Barry Poppel presented the Pure Water for the World project to rehabilitate WASH infrastructure and integrate WASHFIT at Quebrada Larga and El Sarzel Health Care facilities in Danli, Honduras. He wants Dunedin North to join the Rotary Club of Danli, Honduras in raising money and applying

for district and RI matching grants for the \$100,000 project. If our club can raise \$33,000, with help from other clubs, then we can apply for a minimum of 100% match from the district and a 80% match from RI. If we cannot use the DNR Endowment Foundation for donations, Barry offered the Trinity Foundation. The money will be kept separate and returned to us to use for the matching grants. Barry, Mark Middleton and district water chair Stephanie Zaragoza will visit other clubs and pitch the project to help raise funds. This is a follow-up to an earlier club program on another Honduras project when the club expressed interest in participating in raising funds. We have a 5K Race planned in April that Mark Middleton is working on. Gary Coughlin made a motion, seconded by Alan Gustafson, to move forward and support the Pure Water for the World project by raising \$33,000 and applying for the grants. The motion passed.
