

In January 2017, Rick then joined Avow Hospice as Senior Director of Development. He was a key leader securing major gifts, oversaw donor management, and implemented strategic healthcare plans to improve and expand hospice care, child support services, and bereavement programs. He also served as the Senior Military Veteran Advisor for the Avow "We Honor Veterans" program ensuring benefits and satisfaction for military veterans and their families.

Rick is the Founder & President of RJL Consulting Team based in Naples. A firm specializing in Healthcare, Retail Businesses, Physician Practices, Construction, Security, Energy & Environmental, Non-Profits, Government & Military, and accelerating employee & team performance by providing strategic/operational expertise to maximize revenue, volume, and efficiency. His clients include Fortune 500 companies, political figures, non-profits, and a multitude of private businesses. He stepped down and ceased all company activity after he took office as a full-time County Commissioner in November 2020.

Prior to his election and Naples civilian executive positions, he was a senior Air Force officer commanding in leadership positions worldwide. He held military positions in Germany, Hawaii, the Pentagon, and NATO, and lived and worked in 80+ countries. He served as a senior Commander on Andrews Air Force Base supporting the President of the United States and all Air Force One missions. He then led a multi-national NATO unit at Ramstein Air Base, Germany, where he was a Senior Commander responsible for all security, engineering/maintenance, transportation, administration, human resources, supply, logistics, food service, safety, and linguistic translation, supporting the 26-nation command.

Following his Europe assignment, he next served as Base Commander of Eglin Air Force Base in Ft. Walton Beach, Florida. There he ensured support to the 725 square mile base (Department of Defense's largest installation) and directed all base operations for over 35,000 personnel with \$16 Billion in infrastructure. He led strategic planning and oversaw all housing, healthcare, food service, facilities, security, construction, safety, fire/rescue, human resources, IT, environmental, logistics, 3,000+ houses, and 1,000+ dormitories. He also supervised the Air Force's 4th largest Medical Center encompassing 1,500 medical staff supporting 85,000 beneficiaries and 300,000 annual patient visits.

He then served as Base Commander of the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, (where he is also a 1988 graduate) responsible for 4,500 personnel and all support to the 25-square mile installation including the Service Academy. He commanded all Air Force Academy base support, housing, food service, and a Medical Center supporting 4,000+ cadets, a military community of 35,000+, and 500,000+ visitors annually to the military Service Academy. Finally, he was Director of Manpower & Personnel for U.S. Strategic Command, overseeing all human resources (HR) programs for the United States' classified nuclear and space forces. In 2001, he commanded his unit to selections as U.S. Air Force Mission Support Squadron of the Year and was also personally selected as the 2001 U.S. Air Force Senior Personnel Officer of the Year. Rick has worked for two U.S. Presidents, for General Norman Schwarzkopf, and was also the Aide to an Air Force 4-star General for three years. In 2012 he retired from the U.S. Air Force as a full Colonel.

The Commissioner has extensive operations, business, finance, human resources, political, and healthcare experience as well as non-profit leadership expertise working with numerous organizations worldwide. He earned a Bachelor of Science Degree from the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs and has three Master of Science degrees... to include one in Public Administration & Policy from Central Michigan University. Living on Marco Island and working in Naples, Commissioner LoCastro is also very active in the local community having served on the Board of Directors, Marco Island Chamber of Commerce; Board of Trustees, Admiral Farragut Academy (St. Petersburg, FL); is a member of the American College of Healthcare Executives; Collier County American Legion, VFW, & Rotary Club member, and a 2013 Naples Chamber of Commerce Leadership Collier grad.





Speaker Highlights April 1st, 2021

Rick LoCastro

Collier County Commissioner, Rick LoCastro began his presentation describing District 1, in which Marco Island resides:

a very large district ranging from south and east Collier County to the border of Everglades City, including Isles of Capri and Goodland.

90,000 county residents who reside in District 1 and said "I want to hear from my constituents."

15,000 county residents subscribe to his newsletter, join him on "Solutions Saturdays," a program he is starting on April 17 at the South Regional Library, where you can meet with him for a short, 15 -20 minute meeting to let him know your concerns or interests; or attend a town hall meeting (of which he already has held 20 in his first 120 days on the job). The County's budget is \$2 billion dollars.

TIGERTAIL BEACH

One of Commissioner LoCastro's primary interests is Tigertail Beach, which is on the west side of Tigertail Lagoon, between the lagoon and the Gulf waters. That environmentally sensitive beach has not received its due attention in the past several years and following Hurricane Irma, visitors and residents see how that lack of attention has led to the beach's diminishment. Without our attention now, the beach's demise is very possible. The Commissioner has selected leaders of various and diverse agencies to convene, on April 8, to devise a plan that is doable, affordable and able to restore Tigertail.

CAXAMBAS BOAT LAUNCH
The 3 boat launch sites on or surrounding Marco Island, (Caxambas, 951 at the foot of the Jolly Bridge coming on to the Island, and Goodland) are owned and maintained by the County. The Caxambas boat launch currently is under renovation in to accommodate the heavy use by the many businesses that cater primarily to visitors who want to jetski, kayak, or paddle board and the locals who simply want to launch their personal watercraft (PWC) without waiting in long lines while a trailer filled with 6 - 8 PWCs unloads or loads those water devices. The trailer housing the Coast Guard Auxiliary will be removed and a new building is being erected to house the Auxiliary and community meetings. The footprint of the boat launch will not change so additional parking for vehicles will be a challenge as more and more users are launch will not change, so additional parking for vehicles will be a challenge as more and more users arrive. Some sort of priority may be coming with regards to times to launch, who goes first (a vehicle with 1 PWC or many PWCs), etc.

ISLES OF CAPRI

"Septic to Sewer" is an initiative taking place on Isles of Capri. In the past, the County missed some grant opportunities to get financial assistance for this program; so, Commissioner LoCastro is attempting to move this initiative forward.

THE ROAD TO GOODLAND

Many of us know that after a rainstorm and especially after a hurricane, the road to Goodland is under water. The project to raise the road is underway to rectify that problem.

THE MARCO ISLAND EXECUTIVE AIRPORT

This \$9.5 million dollar project was a year and a half behind schedule. The project is now completed. The County is now in litigation to recover some of the money for being so late in completing the project.

CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS AT THE NORTH SIDE OF THE FOOT OF THE JOLLY BRIDGE
The presence of large concrete blocks and other materials used to build an artificial reef out in the Gulf has been such an eyesore primarily due to the length of time it took to move them from the site to the Gulf. Now there is a "privacy" screen placed and paid for by the contractor to hide the eyesore and the amount of time from unloading the materials on the site to loading them on a barge and taking it to the reef site has been greatly reduced from months to days.

Commissioner LoCastro concluded his remarks with a Q/A session. We thank the Commissioner for being our speaker today and wish him the best of luck as he represents us as our Collier County Commissioner.
