### **October 3rd Program:**



Mrs. Rojas joined the FBI in September 1996 as an Investigative Specialist for the New York Field Office. In May 2000, she was promoted to Special Agent and was first assigned to investigate administrative and drug matters in New York. Following the attacks on September 11, 2001, she was assigned to pursuing investigative leads and analyzing terrorism financing data and communications tied to the attacks and terrorism financiers in Counterterrorism Division in New York. In 2005, Mrs. Rojas was promoted to Supervisory Special Agent of the Terrorism Financing Operations Section in

Washington DC. In 2007, Mrs. Rojas returned to the New York Field Office as Supervisory Special Agent of the Applicant program handling FBI hiring, Phase I/II Special Agent testing, foreign language testing, background investigations and special inquiry investigations. In 2008, she was promoted as the Supervisory Special Agent of the Mortgage and Bank Fraud Squad to address the severity of the mortgage fraud crisis and threat to the financial and housing industries. In 2013, she was named ASAC of the Violent Criminal Threat Branch and managed Safe Street gang and violent crime task forces to address the gang threat, bank robberies, fugitives, extra-territorial violent crime and special jurisdiction cases. She also addressed the drug trafficking organizations, crimes against children/human trafficking programs, transnational criminal enterprises and Indian crimes. Mrs. Rojas earned a Bachelor of Science in Communications/Journalism from Boston University and a Master of Science in International Management/Leadership from Manhattanville College.
