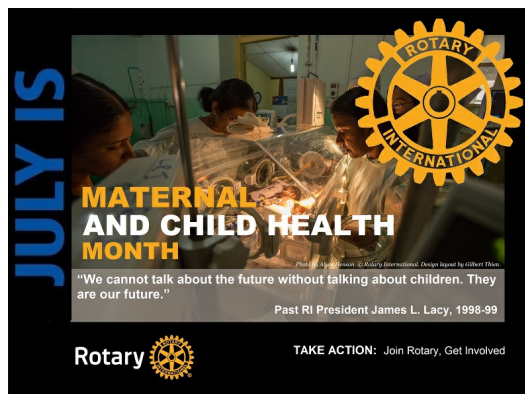

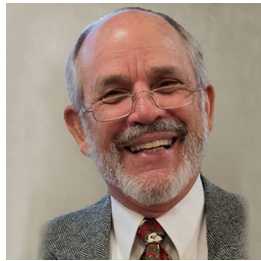

Welcome, Ellen!



Presentation: "Is it Hot in Here or Is It Me?"

A Miami investment manager for over 30 years, Ellen sold her firm and her home and moved to Gainesville, Florida, where she now studies climate science at the University of Florida and trains climate speakers in the science, seriousness and solutions to the current climate crisis. With a BA in Education from the University of Pennsylvania and an MA in Social Psychology from Goddard College, Ellen is here representing The CLEO Institute, Florida's leading climate literacy and advocacy non-partisan non-profit organization. She created and facilitates Climate Conversations for the University of Miami's and University of Florida's Lifelong Learning Institutes. Her passion is to amplify the message: warming is real, it's bad, together we can fix it!



Mickey Ulmer began his career in retail. For 25 years, he developed his skills in advertising, promotions and strategic planning for a variety of consumer-based companies. While helping lead an advertising agency, he expanded his focus to hospitality and customer service which led him to 25 more years with the Sonny's Real Pit Bar-B-Q chain – first as Director of Marketing producing promotions and “from-the-heart” customer service – and then as a franchisee putting all those ideas to work satisfying customers every day.

Mickey excelled at assessing consumer needs and then creating high-impact messages to excite them as customers. His work brought numerous Addy Awards for creativity, then the Silver Medal For Lifetime Achievement from the American Advertising Federation, and later he was twice recognized Business Of The Year by the Amelia Island Chamber of Commerce. Throughout the years, he served on a number of civic boards including the Patient Advisory Council for Baptist/Nassau Medical Center and Advertising Advisory Council for The University of Florida College of Journalism and Communication where he was made Professor Honorarius for his years of service to the college and its students.

As a restaurateur, Mickey fine-tuned his community service skills supporting Toy For Tots, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, the Navy League and more; he helped organize a Cold Night Shelter and continually donated food to the relief effort; and he opened his restaurant each Thanksgiving Day to provide over 200 people in need of a hearty meal and a bit of encouragement.

As a member and president of the Rotary Club of Amelia Island Sunrise, he found new avenues for his passion for service and became a Paul Society member. Moving on to District responsibilities, Mickey has served as Area 4 Assistant Governor, Fund & Procedures Committee member and is currently the RLI Director for District 6970.

Native Floridians, Mickey and his wife, Gale, moved to Palm Coast at the end of 2020 where he is currently a member of the Rotary Club of Flagler Beach. With his District responsibilities continuing to expand, Mickey is committed to service being his focus for his next 25 years

Stephanie Urchick, RI President 2024-25



Rotary International President-elect Stephanie Urchick announced that the 2024-25 presidential theme is *The Magic of Rotary* and called on members to recognize and amplify the organization's power to save lives.

“Don’t misunderstand me – we are not going to end polio or bring peace to the world by waving a wand and saying some funny words,” Urchick told incoming district governors at the Rotary International Assembly on 8 January. “It’s up to you. You create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member.”

Urchick, a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA, said she saw the magic of Rotary on display when she was helping install water filters in the Dominican Republic. Two boys were watching as dirty water entered the filter, then ran out clean at the other end.

“One of the boys grabbed my sleeve and said, ‘Show me the magic again,’” she said. “Obviously, the water filter wasn’t magic. We worked hard to transport those filters, install them, and work with community leaders in the area to maintain them. But those boys knew that easy access to clean water would change their lives. Knowing that I played a small part in that certainly changed my life.”

Prioritizing peace

Urchick urged members to champion Rotary's Action Plan, find a balance between continuity and change, and work for peace. She plans to host a presidential peace conference in 2025 with the theme “Healing in a Divided World.”

Rotary has a long history of promoting peace through its network of peace centers, Urchick noted. Located at top universities around the globe, the centers have trained nearly 1,800 peace fellows who are now working in more than 140 countries. The newest center, located at Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey, will welcome its first class of fellows in early 2025.

“The Rotary Peace Fellowship began more than 20 years ago to equip peace and development professionals from communities around the world to become effective catalysts for ending and preventing conflict,” Urchick said. “This conference will focus on Rotary’s peace efforts and provide opportunities to learn together.”

In addition to emphasizing peacebuilding, Urchick reiterated Rotary’s commitment to eradicating polio. She urged the incoming governors to join or initiate PolioPlus Societies in their districts and do all they can to help end the disease.

“Contact elected officials and other government leaders. Remind them that polio is still a threat. Push them to support polio eradication,” she said. “Polio remains our top priority and requires our fullest commitment, but there is so much important work to do.”

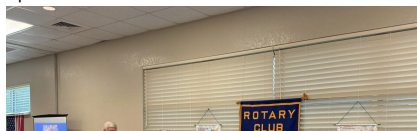

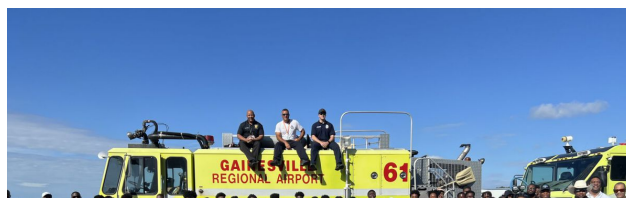
CONGRATS to David Bridges and Matt Bowman for another successful and AWESOME Aviation Academy!

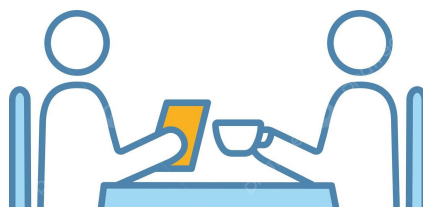
