Sandy Cook is the Executive Director and Co-Founder of Halifax Repertory Theatre (HRT), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to bringing high-quality musical theatre back to the Eastern Volusia County community. She and her husband, Jack, founded HRT four years ago in response to the noticeable decline in live musical theatre opportunities for teens and adults post-COVID. Having both grown up in the area during a time when the arts thrived, they were passionate about restoring that creative outlet for the next generation.

HRT offers voice and dance instruction, produces full-scale musicals, and uses its Ormond Beach studio for auditions and rehearsals—renting larger local theaters for performances. Upcoming shows include Guys and Dolls at the News-Journal Center (July 25–August 3), Annie in October, and Jingles and Jammies in December at the Ormond Beach Performing Arts Center.

Before founding HRT, Sandy spent 25 years as a performer and in the legal field as a paralegal. She decided to leave her career and dedicate her efforts to building the Halifax Repertory Theater. Her husband, Jack Cook, is a trial partner at Morgan & Morgan and Halifax Repertory's biggest supporter.

Together, they are building something special for the community—bringing an elite level of musical theater entertainment to East Volusia County. Community support is vital to their mission, and they encourage everyone to attend performances and consider becoming sponsors to help this vision continue to grow.






