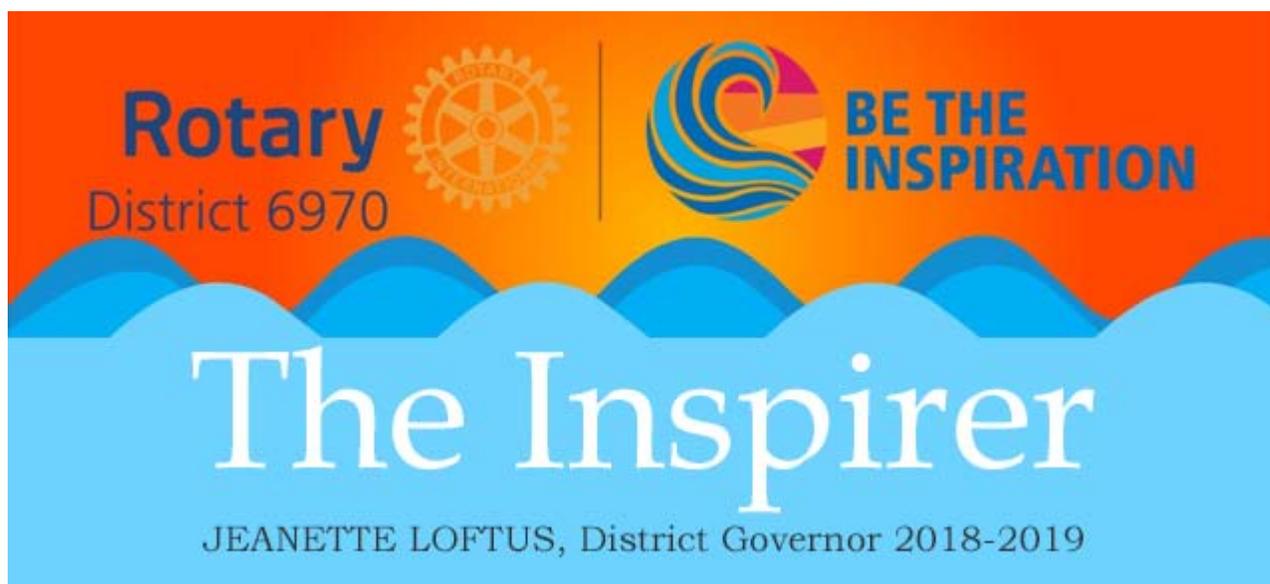

## April is Maternal and Child Health Month

In April Rotarians celebrate Maternal and child health.

Basically, maternal health ensures that we have healthy moms raising healthy kids, but it's not quite as simple as this.

Maternal health begins with nurturing the young girl and ensuring that from an early age they have access to an education, quality health care and gender equality.

If mothers are empowered and healthy, so are their families, which ultimately can lead to the alleviation of poverty, hunger and disease.

Rotarians around the world recognize the importance of these basic essentials and provide the help and training necessary for mothers to take control of their own health and that of their children.

We fund and support medical and dental clinics right here in Northeast Florida and have equipped a pink medical Jeep

with medical supplies in Haiti so volunteers and midwives can reach mothers and children in the most remote areas.

And when local families fall under hard times, Rotary is here to help. We send backpacks filled with food home with school children for the weekend and fund and build playgrounds like with one here at the St Francis House in Gainesville. This was built by Rotaractors who visited the homeless shelter only to find children inside huddled around a tv instead of outside playing. Those Rotaractors contacted their local Rotary Clubs and with the help of a district grant built this beautiful playground so families could have a space to run and play and enjoy fun in the Florida sun.

During April and throughout the year, I invite you to Be The Inspiration to the moms and families in your community.

"EVERY ROTARIAN AN EXAMPLE TO YOUTH"

In much of the official literature of Rotary International relating to service to young people, a special slogan will be found - "Every Rotarian an Example to Youth." These words were adopted in 1949 by the Rotary International Board of



Directors as an expression of commitment to children and youth in each community in which Rotary clubs exist. Serving young people has long been an important part of the Rotary program.

Youth service projects take many forms around the world. Rotarians sponsor Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, athletic teams, handicapped children's centers, school safety patrols, summer camps, recreation areas, safe driving clinics, county fairs, child care centers and children's hospitals. Many clubs provide vocational counseling, establish youth employment program and promote use of The 4 -Way Test. Increasingly, drug and alcohol abuse prevention projects are being supported by Rotarians.

In every instance, Rotarians have an opportunity to be role model for the young men and women of their community. One learns to serve by observing others. As our youth grow to become adult leaders, it is hoped each will achieve that same desire and spirit to serve future generations of children and youth. The slogan accepted over 40 years ago is just as vital today. It is a very thoughtful challenge, "Every Rotarian an Example to Youth."
