

Rotary International News - December 18, 2023

State Champs!

TALLAHASSEE – After 20 years, Daytona Beach is home again to a Florida state football champion.

Jacob Gettman was true on a 23-yard field goal as time expired, sending No. 2 Mainland (14-1) past No. 1 St. Augustine (13-0) on Thursday at Bragg Memorial Stadium, the home of Florida A&M University. It marked the first head-to-head meeting between the two storied schools, separated by about an hour on Interstate 95, since 1996.

Mainland last won a state crown in 2003 and current coach Travis Roland played on that team. It marked the second consecutive December the Bucs had reached the championship game after falling 32-30 to Lake Wales a year ago.

The Yellow Jackets entered with one of the most explosive offenses in the state, averaging 43.3 points per game, with a loaded group of weapons at the skill positions – quarterback Locklan Hewlett, running back Devonte Lyons and wide receivers Carl Jenkins Jr., Trenton Jones, Myles Simmons and Somourian Wingo.



Mainland, by contrast, boasted one of the most dominant defensive units in Florida, allowing opponents to score just 12.1 ppg. Florida defensive lineman commit LJ McCray, All-American defensive back Zavier Mincey, Tulane linebacker commit Rodney Hill and coveted cornerback recruit Ezaiah Shine are among the Bucs' standout performers.

The Bucs held St. Augustine to just one offensive touchdown though it was nearly enough. The Yellow Jackets scored on an opening kickoff return touchdown and then returned a blocked field goal to the end zone, leading 13-0 at halftime. From there, Mainland scored 18-straight points to take an 18-13 lead with St. Augustine scoring early in the fourth quarter to reclaim the advantage 19-18.

But Mainland was able to muster one more drive, bolstered by a conversion on a fourth-and-7 to get well within field goal range and set up Gettman's heroics.

SHARING ROTARY WITH NEW MEMBERS

Are you aware of the responsibility or obligation most Rotarians fail to perform? Paying their dues? Attending meetings? Contributing to the club service fund? Participating in club events and projects? No-none of these!

Of all the obligations a person accepts when joining a Rotary club the one in which most Rotarians fail is "sharing Rotary." The policies of Rotary International clearly affirm that every individual Rotarian has an "obligation to share Rotary with others and to help extend Rotary through proposing qualified persons for Rotary club membership." It is estimated that less than 30 percent of the members of most Rotary clubs have ever made the effort to propose a new member. Thus, in every club, there are many Rotarians who readily accept the pleasures of being a Rotarian without ever sharing that privilege with another qualified individual.

The Rotary policy on club membership states: "In order for a Rotary club to be fully relevant to its community and responsive to the needs of those in the community, it is important and necessary that the club include in its membership all fully qualified prospective members located within its territory" One merely has to glance through the yellow pages of the local telephone directory to realize that most clubs have not invited qualified members of all businesses and professions into Rotary. Only a Rotarian may propose a customer, neighbor, client, supplier, executive, relative, business associate, professional or other qualified person to join a Rotary club. Have you accepted your obligation to share Rotary? The procedures are very simple, and everyone must know at least one person who should belong to Rotary.
