She earned a Bachelor of Science in Medical (Laboratory) Technology from Bethune-Cookman University, and she later earned a Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Colorado in Colorado Springs. Since she retired from Bert Fish Medical Center as the Director of Medical Laboratory Services, she has been teaching microbiology to nursing students at Daytona College in Ormond Beach.

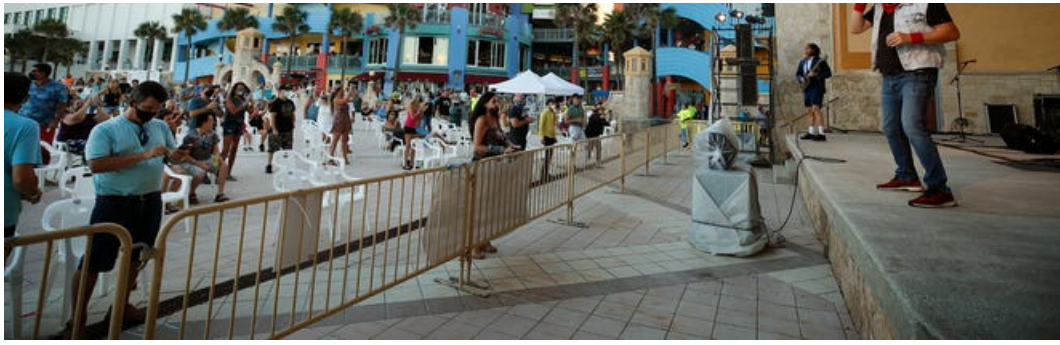

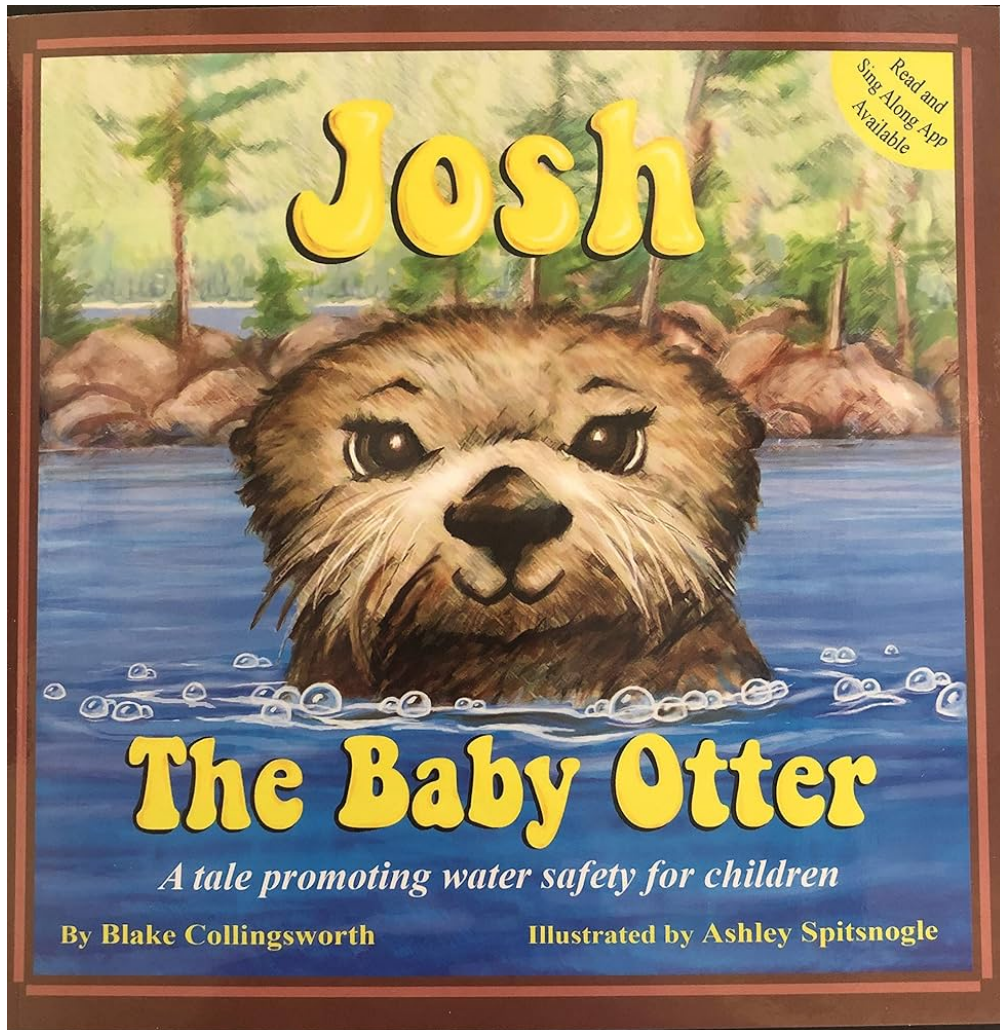
