Estate planning is the process of organizing and managing an individual's assets and affairs to ensure that their wishes are carried out after their death and to minimize potential legal and financial complications. It involves several key components, including drafting a will to specify how assets should be distributed, establishing trusts to manage and protect assets during one's lifetime and after death, and designating beneficiaries for insurance policies and retirement accounts. Additionally, estate planning often includes creating advance directives and powers of attorney to address medical and financial decisions if one becomes incapacitated. By thoughtfully considering these elements, estate planning helps ensure that an individual's estate is handled according to their preferences, reduces potential estate taxes, and provides clarity and support for loved ones during a challenging time.

More than half of surveyed young farmers met the criteria for depression, and 71 percent showed signs of generalized anxiety disorder, a 2018 study found. The Rotary Club of Iowa Great Lakes (Spirit Lake) is working to support and destigmatize farmer's mental health struggles.

When farmers delivered harvests to local cooperatives in Dickinson County, Iowa, in 2022, many left with something unexpected: a goody bag provided by a local Rotary club, each bag contained goodies and a small card that read: "Work in Agriculture Can be Stressful. It'S Okay to Ask for Help.â€

Paul Harris Was First, But Not First!

Was Paul Harris the first president of a Rotary Club? No.




Was Paul Harris the first president of Rotary International? Yes.

There is an easy explanation to this apparent contradiction. Although Paul Harris was the founder and organizer of the first Rotary club in Chicago in 1905, the man selected to be the first president was one of the other founding members, Silvester Schiele.

By the year 1910, there were 16 Rotary clubs, which linked up as an organization called the National Association of Rotary Clubs. Two years later, the name was changed to the International Association of Rotary Clubs, as Rotary was organized in Winnipeg, Canada, and then in England, Ireland and Scotland. In 1922, the name was shortened to Rotary International.

When the first organization of Rotary clubs was created in 1910, Paul Harris was selected as the first president. He served in this position for two years, from 1910 until 1912. Thus, the founder of the Rotary idea, who declined to be president of the first club, became the first president of the worldwide organization, Rotary International.
