Step Up and Help Distribute Dictionaries to Local 3rd Graders

As explained at last week's meeting, the Dictionary Project is getting underway this week. For those who may not know, the Dictionary Project is a long-running joint effort by all the Rotary Clubs in Gainesville to distribute a paperback dictionary to each and every 3rd grader in Alachua County public schools.

There are 2 ways to help. Feel free to do one or both!

- 1. Attend a labeling party at the Ronald McDonald House (the new location at 2121 SW 16th St) to affix the labels to the books. We will do this on **TUESDAY**, **April 23**, **2024**, **beginning at 3 pm.** If you can come help, great!
- 2. Select a school where you can distribute dictionaries this week. Please deliver the books on one of the school days before May 1, when standardized testing takes place. You will need to pick up the box of dictionaries counted and labeled for your school either at the labeling party, or at some point before you visit the school. Email Dorothy with your top choices and we'll try to get you accommodated. We'll also send you all the info you need to make contact.

This Week: Orange Insurance Exchange


Last Week: GRU's Integrated Resource Plan

We learned a lot last week about how GRU does its long range planning to provide electricity in its service area, which covers about 75% of Alachua County. GRU has a number of generating options with one of them going offline in 2027 due to age and technology becoming obsolete. Deciding on which technology to use sometimes requires four years from decision to the generating technology coming online. Longe range planning is started



every 3â€"5 years and looks far into the future. We also learned some practical tips. If you are thinking about adding solar power to your rooftop, first look at replacing windows and updating your HVAC units to the most energy efficient technology. The savings may be better than installing solar power.
