Finding the Market in UF Student Housing

Last week we heard an excellent presentation from John Fleming, managing partner of Trimark Properties Trimark

-

поренская типнанк specializes in upscale boutique student housing in the area between NW 13th Street and NW6th Street. Trimark started in 2002 with their first property and now owns most of the area. They figured out that a market existed for upscale, small number of unit rental units (20 to 50), but with few amenities (such as pools), with the main draw of being close to campus. Here are some interesting things we learned about Trimark and the area:

- They own one-half of the UF Innovation District
- They are self-contained and construct their own buildings to rent



- The average Tier I university has a 1.3 students per bed ratio; UF's is .67
- Their renters are 70-80% female
- Occupancy rate is 99%
- Rental rates are 30% higher than average because they are upscale and close to campus
- More affluent parents + Bright Futures student support has helped their business model
- The market is changing again; large outlying apartments built for students are now shifting to working renters
- Construction costs have doubled in three years, making it harder to achieve scale on smaller units
- They now own First Baptist Church and Seagle Building and are converting them to rental apartments
- They are also now doing some buildings for UFHealth in Springhill area





Editor's note: Rory found a planter with a tree in it, sponsored by the Lyon, France Rotary Club. Give the man a meeting makeup.








The Robinsons Had a Great Day of Fishing
