There will be 11 science 'stations' set up in the school cafetorium. Each station will have hands-on activities, and students will get a chance to meet scientists and explore different scientific concepts related to Florida natural history. Examples include: building tools that Florida Museum scientists use, like a bug aspirator, learning about flight and sounds in nature with hoop gliders and sandwich kazoos, and many more. One of the stations will be our own Rick Medina teaching about fossils from his own personal collection.

The students will each have a pre-printed passport card to use during the event that will be hole punched as they complete each station. Once students complete all stations, passports will be collected for a raffle for a free family pass to the butterfly rainforest and some museum swag. And pizza dinner will be served.






Becky and Jim Cato in Oklahoma City

Becky and Jim Cato spent last Thursday-Saturday attending the 2023 USA Developmental Program Gymnastics National Championships. Grandson Thomas competed in the 17-year-old age group as part of the Texas Dreams Gym from Coppell, Texas. Thomas was part of the Region 3 Team which placed first among 9 regions of the US in team competitions. In individual competitions, Thomas earned five medals. He came in 2nd in Floor, T8th in Rings, 5th in Parallel Bars, 6th in High Bar and 6th in All-Around, in the nation. A total of 1,500 men and women gymnasts competed from 14-19 years old. There were 100+ competitors that qualified for the national competition in Thomas' 17-year-old age group.
