In 2016, Gamble co-founded The Selling Factory in downtown Gainesville. Through its innovative Sales Apprenticeship model, The Selling Factory has hired, trained, and placed over 1,200 college students, providing lead generation services to more than 150 companies worldwide.

The Cade Museum for Creativity and Invention in Gainesville began in 2006 with a generous gift from Dr. James Robert Cade, the lead inventor of Gatorade and opened its doors in 2018. Since then, the museum has welcomed more than 100,000 visitors.

Sunrisers Have Done Japan And Are On The Way Home

Editor's Note: Sunrisers Jim Cato, Bobbie Robinson and BarBee Geiger have been abroad over the last couple of weeks, and their trip is now coming to a close. Enjoy these snapshots of their trip.

Jim writes, "We have completed our journey called Japan: Kyoto, the Japanese Alps and Tokyo. We started in Osaka in the south and went to Hiroshima, Kyoto, Nara, Kanazawa, Takayama, Kamikochi, and other places in between, before arriving in Tokyo. We'll be departing Tokyo between Monday and Wednesday to make our way back to Gainesville."



We took a cooking class one evening to learn how to make a traditional Japanese meal, which became our dinner. Rice, pork, egg, flour, cabbage and other ingredients were used, all consumed using chopsticks.





We took a day-looooong trip to Mount Fugi. The first snow of the winter happened two days before our visit, the latest first-snow in 130 years, so the mountain was not yet snow capped. The peak is at 12,400 feet and we went to 7,600 feet where it was 42F and above the sea of clouds. The day was beautiful and our bus driver who had made the trip 14 times this year said it was the best day so far.



We also took a hike along a mountain trail that was seven miles long. About half our group of 18 made the entire walk; the other half went about three miles.



We made a trip into the Japanese Alps where the fall color was at its peak. This was a highly picturesque area.



We have ridden one express train, three bullet trains and lots of motor coaches across Japan. The bullet trains are fun; from the time the train reaches the platform and passengers get off, and you get on, you have one minute. Move slow and you miss the train!



All across Japan we have seen lots of people wearing kimonos. Three year olds, teenagers, families, and wedding parties. Most of the kimonos are rentals; just dressing up the traditional way for a fun day out or a samurai!





We learned the traditional way to make tea through an hour-long teamaking ceremony. Bobbi and BarBee were the champion tea makers.



We have visited so many temples and shrines that they have become a blur. This is the entrance to a shrine that is an entire mountain. You can climb to the top of the mountain through thousands of these red arches.





Our last event of the trip was a group farewell dinner in a traditional Japanese restaurant, low tables, shoes off. We had sushi, chicken, beef and a dessert. The saki, wine and beer flowed freely and a good time was had by all.
