Colleen Bell, MD, FACHE, FAPA a Board Certified Psychiatrist by training, has dedicated her career to working with the underserved. She is the current Medical Director of Integrated at the Sulzbacher Center in Jacksonville, where she leads a diverse staff in terms of licensure, is engaged in homeless outreach as well as clinic visits, and administrative functions that includes funding, growth and development of medical and psychiatric programs and services. She oversees the HOPE Teams, which are the street outreach programs, as well as the mobile medical bus, ♦Hope and Health on Wheels. ♦ She is the lead for the mental health diversion program in Jacksonville. She is also core faculty for the Orange Park Medical Center Psychiatry residency program.

Previously, she was the Medical Executive Director at Northeast Florida State Hospital and was responsible for all clinical operations of the 633 bed hospital. While there, she actively recruited and hired psychiatrists, and fully staffed the hospital in terms of psychiatry staff for the first time in 10 years. She led the transition into DSM 5, and spearheaded the use of an Electronic Medication Administration Record for the hospital, as well as oversaw where funds are allocated within the medical department and served as Chairperson and a key participant on multiple committees.

She completed her residency training in psychiatry at Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic in Pittsburgh, part of the University at Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC), which in 2016 made the U.S. News & World Report ♦s Honor Roll of America ♦s ♦Best Hospitals ♦ for 17th Time (number 12 overall). While there she served as Chief Resident for Ambulatory Services. She also completed a Community Psychiatry Fellowship while in Pittsburgh. She completed medical school at University at Buffalo School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences, and was inducted into Alpha Omega Alpha for high grades.

She has conducted volunteer legislation review for State Senator Aaron Bean, and some her recommendations were adopted into Senate Bill 12, a mental health overhaul bill signed into law in Florida. She also participated in the Regional leadership Academy, as well as selected by the Jacksonville Business Journal for the "40 under 40" class of 2015. She was a Prudential Productivity Award team winner in 2016 for a 35% Overall Reduction in Pharmaceutical Expenditures at Northeast Florida State Hospital. She is a member of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society, the American Psychiatric Association ♦ Fellow, the Florida Psychiatric Society, the American Association of Community Psychiatrists, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) and a fellow and member of the American College of Healthcare Executives (ACHE).

Dr. Bell lives in Jacksonville, FL with her husband and 3 small children. She serves on three boards: she is the current Board President for NAMI Jacksonville, and was responsible for the hiring of NAMI Jacksonville ♦s first Executive Director. She was elected and currently serves as a board member to the national group the American Association for Community Psychiatry. She is also a Director at Large for the North Florida chapter of ACHE. Her goal is to expand quality medical and mental health awareness and services for Northeast Florida.

This week in History

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Tiger Woods Wins the Masters for the First Time

On April 13, 1997, 21-year-old Tiger Woods wins the prestigious Masters Tournament by a record 12 strokes in Augusta, Georgia. It was Woods's first victory in one of golf's four major championships—the U.S. Open, the British Open, the PGA Championship, and the Masters—and the greatest performance by a professional golfer in more than a century. It also made him the youngest golfer by two years to win the Masters and the first person of Asian or African heritage to win a major. Eldrick "Tiger" Woods was born in a suburb of Los Angeles, California, on December 30, 1975. The only child of an African American father and a Thai mother, Woods was encouraged from infancy by his father for a career in golf. At the age of two, he teed off against comedian Bob Hope on television's *Mike Douglas Show*. At five years old, he was featured on the television show *That's Incredible*. At age eight, Woods won his first junior world championship, and in 1991, at age 15, he became the youngest player ever to win the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship. He also captured the 1992 and 1993 Junior Amateur titles, and in 1994 accepted a scholarship to attend Stanford University. That year, he came from six holes behind to win the first of his three consecutive U.S. Amateur championships. He was 18 years old and the youngest Amateur champion in history.

In 1995, Woods played the Masters, his first professional major championship. The Augusta National Golf Club, which runs the Masters, had not let an African American join its ranks until 1991. Woods finished 41st in his first Masters appearance. In 1996, he won the collegiate title. By this time, he was already attracting considerable media attention and attracting throngs of new fans to the sport. After claiming his third U.S. Amateur title, Woods left college and turned professional in August 1996. Playing as a pro in eight Professional Golfers' Association (PGA) events in 1996, he won a title and was named the PGA Tour's outstanding rookie. In December 1996, he was celebrated by the magazine *Sports Illustrated* as its Sportsman of the Year.
