



Three Things You Can Do to Make Our Local Water Supply Healthier

At our club meeting last week (March 16) St. Johns Riverkeeper, Lisa Rinaman, gave us the latest "State of the River Report" on our local waterways. St. Johns County scored passing marks this past year when it came to handling its wildlife, decreasing sewage spills and maintaining good water quality. However, we received failing grades for salinity levels in our waterways, maintaining our

wetlands, controlling invasive species, limiting pesticide usage and keeping phosphorous levels down.



Rinaman said there are three things you and I can do every day to help raise our failing grades. They are:

- 1.) **Scoop Poop** if you have a dog, pick up up after yourself on walks. Animal waste runs off into our local streams.
- 2.) Use Lawn Fertilizers Wisely organic fertilizers over chemical ones; used when necessary
- 3.) **Conserve Water** don't needlessly waste your tap water


All 4 Local High Schools Will Join our Rubber Ducky Regatta Effort This Year

Hundreds of local high schoolers will be helping us adopt out ducks for this year's Rubber Ducky Regatta! The National Honor Societies at all 4 local high schools — Bartram Trail, Creekside, Nease and Ponte Vedra — have signed on to partner with us for this year's event. Partnership coordinators, Denny Baldwin and Bob Wiltfong, say these relationships are a major lift to our fundraising efforts and should result in a lot more adoption sales than years past. "National Honor Society students need so many service hours each year to fulfill their member obligations," says Wiltfong. "Partnering

with a service organization like the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra on our Rubber Ducky Regatta makes perfect sense for both sides."

The 7th Annual Rubber Ducky Regatta raises money by encouraging people to "adopt" a duck (or group of ducks in the race). Adoption fees



range from \$5 for one ducky up to \$100 for the "Quacks Galore" package of 25 duckies. You can adopt your duck(s) by going to https://learntoreadstjohns.org/product/rubber-ducky-regatta-adoption/. All proceeds from the event benefit Learn to Read of St. Johns County and our Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra.

The ducks will waddle to the finish line opposite the Palm Valley Outdoors Bar & Grill (377 S. Roscoe Blvd., Ponte Vedra Beach, FL 32082, headquarters for the event).
