
Rotary Readers: The RR party was June 10 at 9:30AM. The program will start up sometime in October. Contact information shown earlier in the newsletter.

Matching Grants

One of the most popular programs of the Rotary Foundation is Matching Grants which assists Rotary clubs and districts in conducting international service projects. Since 1965, more than 24,000 grants have been awarded for projects in nearly 170 countries, totaling more than \$243million.

The Rotary Foundation provides matching funds to clubs or districts for relatively small, one-time only humanitarian service projects. Grants are awarded for a wide variety of projects, such as providing agriculture, water, and medical care equipment, combating diseases, helping the disabled; promoting literacy and numeracy; and developing educational or occupational training programs. The minimum grant award is \$5.000.00 and he maximum is \$150,000.00. The Foundation provides a \$.50 match for every \$1. Cash contribution and a \$1 match for every \$1 District Designated Fund contribution.

Matching grants are not approved to purchase land or construct buildings and may not be used for programs already underway or completed. Persona participation by Rotarians is required, and the benefits should extend beyond the recipients. The Matching Grants program plays a very significant part in The Rotary Foundation's humanitarian work and provides an important incentive for club to undertake worthwhile service projects in another part of the world.

Program

Today's program was presented by Bryce Baldwin pastor of the Rome Alliance church.

The mission of the church is to invite others to share in the hope, healing, and love of the gospel.

The program that Bryce delivered was on Transformational Job Fairs which he has undertaken to help in the community. He also spoke about a flea market to help individuals seeking a job to help them "dress for success:. I don't know if it is something in operation or not. I couldn't find a reference to "Nearly New" flea market on the internet.

Bryce asked for stories from the members to illustrate how a work place made them feel good. Helping people with

employment, job fairs makes the community a better place to live. He mentioned a story about from Lewiston, Maine where a family's shoe company started in the 1970's had an excellent reputation. Things closed down after time and then thirty years later, Somalian refugees moved there and reinvested in the community by opening stores and businesses. The school district's K-9 building now has 900 students. Reinvesting in the community is important Bryce also told a similar story from Bible times where the Israelites were overrun by the Babylonians and the Lord gave Jeremiah a letter to give to the Babylonians that encouraged them to build homes, plant gardens, stay and have children, and work for people to build prosperity for the city.

At the community job fairs, it is important to greet people when they enter. Help is provided wit resumes if needed. They listen to people and then help. The fair personnel also works with employers. They ask what the business is looking for.

The Rome Community job fairs are non-profit. The church does not receive anything for working the fairs. The fairs take place in September and April. The September fair will be **September 29**.
