Speaker – Mike Patsy introduced our speaker – Joe Eliza – speaking today on the Pittsburgh Metropolitan Area Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

Joe's Bio

Joe Eliza has owned and run a training business since 2004, where they have trained managers, executives and professionals to be successful, to achieve their goals faster, better and at a lower cost, but most importantly to have significance for everybody around them.

His international experience in business consulting and professional training in a range of industries, has progressed from Manufacturing Engineering to Six Sigma Master Black Belt, international consultant and trainer. His Professional Development programs are based on the application of Organizational Neurology and Intentional Change methodologies to real business situations.

He has coached and trained people for more than 16 years, both in English and Spanish, including more than 4 years of developing training programs for more than 200 people in all organizational levels, improving the efficiency and productivity of more than 20 Federal Government Agencies across the country, with an innovative remote training program developed for them.

He also has been a member of the Board of Directors at the Pittsburgh Metropolitan Area Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, working with this organization to help the local hispanic owned businesses to thrive and succeed as part of his global mission.

His day to day activities have a positive impact on the lives of those he works with, the organizations they work in and all the people they touch along the way.

Joe's speech:

Joe Eliza shared the mission of the Pittsburgh Metropolitan Area Hispanic Chamber of Commerce is to develop, promote, and advocate for the Hispanic Businesses and Professionals in the Pittsburgh region while encouraging the advancement and economic growth of Pittsburgh's Hispanic community, to be a driving factor in the region's economy.

The 4 driving factors that drive the organization is networking via organizing events, professional development by partnering with SBA centers, community of PMAHCC and scholarships.

Joe mentioned the importance of building the chamber of commerce into groups to help with translating both ways to create cost and communication efficiencies amongst individuals who speak different languages. That is something Joe can help with. Since 2011 – PMAHCC has awarded over \$210,000 in scholarships and to more than 130 qualifying area students of Hispanic/Latino descent. This funding makes a big impact in the local communities.

Joe shared that the Latino population is one of the fastest growing populations in southwest PA – per US Census Bureau – by 2025 25% of the population will be Hispanic in the US. There is \$1.7 billion buying power in the US – this is 55% increase from 2010. Latino's open businesses at a rate of 8 to 1 when compared to Caucasians. In Pittsburgh the Hispanic Population grew 70% from 2010 to 2014....and from 2014 to 2018 it grew 100%. There are now over 1 million Latinos in the Pennsylvania. This is all data from the Duquesne Small Business Development Center from 2010-2018.

Karen Newpol asked what types of businesses are being opened and Joe shared lots in construction and medical sectors. Many doctors at UPMC coming from Argentina, Mexico, etc. There are over 25 countries included in the community.

As a Chamber many events in 2022 events scheduled – Charity Basketball Game – coming up January 11th 2:30pm to 5:30pm at Penn State Greater Allegheny 4000 University Dr. McKeesport, PA 15132 – this supports the scholarships that are paid out. Celebrations of Love event Feb 14th – Diversity and Inclusion Certificate Program – this will be May 5th 9am to 6pm – Pittsburgh Business Show at the David L Lawrence Convention Center. 80% of the training is about raising awareness. Restaurant Showcase and Training June 20. Hispanic Heritage Month and Fiesta Navidena celebrated – 150 people and big celebration.
