November 06, 2024 Meeting Summary

Paul Gray opened the meeting and introduced Ken Calvert, who led the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. Sharon Moore provided the week's Sunshine.

Please note that there will be no meetings on 11/20 or 11/27. However, on November 20 at 4:30 pm, the club will help Girls Inc. to serve their annual Thanksgiving dinner. More details will be provided closer to the event.

Throughout November the club is collecting money for Rotary International's Polio Plus campaign in honor of World Polio Day. Cash, check or Venmo payments will be accepted through November, or members can request billing. Happy Dollars in the amount of \$131 were collected today on behalf of Polio Plus and the club received a check for \$84 as our share of the Pints for Polio event last month.



Dr. Judy Fischer introduced this week's speaker, Dr. Stacey McKenzie-Means, an infectious disease specialist with the Providence Medical Clinic in Kingsport. She provided an update on the state of polio infections around the world as part of the club's recognition of World Polio Day.

Polio is currently believed to be ninety-nine percent eradicated around the world, but there are several strains still circulating, including the wild strain and an escaped strain from the live vaccine utilized everywhere except the Americas. Only killed vaccines are used in North and South America because there are no strains that exist in this region and the protection can be slightly less effective and yet still completely protect the populations. Live-strain vaccines are still used in other regions of the world where the disease is still existing in various hot spots.

Dr. McKenzie-Means also discussed the news that a new vaccine that can better fight the escaped strain of polio has been developed, as well as the use of Vitamin A drops alongside the oral polio vaccine to improve its effectiveness in children.

Paul closed the meeting with a recitation of the Four-Way Test.



Poinsettia/Wreath Fundraiser



One of the club's fundraising campaigns over the last few years has been the sale of Poinsettia Plants at Christmas. 

Rotary club's plastic cleanup leads to new benches

Tracey Craft, adult services coordinator for the Springfield Library, and Tracy Obremski, a technical services librarian, read on two of the benches earned by the Springfield Rotary Club through the plastic film recycling challenge.

Last year, I read about a project conducted by the Capital City Sunrise Rotary Club in New Hampshire, USA. The club collected plastic film and received a recycled bench. Since I enjoy learning about successful club projects and figuring out ways to replicate them, I contacted the club's president, who readily agreed to give a presentation to our club.

That was the beginning of our own community recycling initiative.

Beginning in February of 2023, we entered the NexTrex Recycling Challenge on behalf of our community. Through its recycling program, Trex, a manufacturer of wood-alternative decking products, encourages the public to recycle grocery bags, bread bags, produce bags, cereal bags, ice bags, case

overwrap, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, Ziploc and other re-sealable bags, and wrap for other objects. For every 1,000 pounds of plastic film a sponsoring organization collects, Trex donates a four-foot long composite bench through its furniture line. The benches are made out of milk jugs and water bottles, while the collected plastic waste is used in other Trex decking products.

We placed a bin in our town library, and also collected plastics from a local manufacturer, hospital, and food co-op. Residents gladly pitched in, diverting more than 6,143 pounds of plastic film from the waste stream.

Weekly posts on social media keep the community apprised of the progress. To date, eight benches have been installed around the Springfield community, with a ninth underway. Each bench has a plaque that acknowledges our club and is dedicated to our 95th anniversary.

One of the most significant benefits of the challenge has been increased awareness. I have become more mindful of the pervasive presence of plastics in everyday life. This has sparked me to have conversations with friends, family, and colleagues, igniting a ripple effect throughout our community that has increased awareness of plastic waste.

This has truly been a rewarding project, as we reduce plastic waste, promote financial savings, empower personal responsibility, and foster community engagement. We are helping people embrace sustainable practices in our daily lives.

As we strive towards a cleaner, healthier planet, each of us has the power to make a difference – one plastic-free choice at a time.
