#### June 11 Meeting Preview Melissa Woods, President—Kingsport City Schools Board of Education



Melissa Woods was elected to the Kingsport Board of Education in 2021 for her first four-year term. The term expires on June 30, 2025.

Born and raised in Elizabethton, Tennessee, Melissa graduated as class valedictorian. She earned a B.S. degree in Accounting as an Honors graduate from Milligan University.

Melissa moved to Kingsport over 30 years ago to become an Accountant & Systems Analyst at Eastman Chemical Company. She

has experience in information technology, cost accounting, and was the Staff Assistant for the Eastman Maintenance Division. Melissa currently serves as the Director of Music Ministries at Colonial Heights Christian Church.

After leaving her corporate career in 1999, Melissa shifted her focus to community service. She has worked alongside teachers, coaches, and the KCS administration for the past eighteen years. Her involvement has been very diverse; she has served as a homeroom mom, PTA president, Dobyns-Bennett Band president, and in many other leadership roles along the way. Melissa also has a track record of service to the Kingsport community at large. She has volunteered in roles with the Women's Symphony Committee, the Kingsport Tomorrow Vision Team, and Kingsport's ShowTime Productions as the Assistant Vocal Director. Melissa has been recognized as an Outstanding Young Woman of America and received a City of Kingsport Mayoral Commendation for her years of dedication to the betterment of our youth and support to the Kingsport community.

Paul Gray opened the meeting and introduced Ken Calvert, who led the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. Emily Ball provided the week's Sunshine.

The club's final social event for the year will be a picnic at the June 13 Kingsport Axemen baseball game at 6:00pm. The club has reserved a pavilion and will serve hamburgers and hot dogs.

Kitty Frazier introduced the week's speaker, member Lynn Tully, who serves as the regional director for Northeast Tennessee in the Department of Economic and Community Development. Lynn works with existing manufacturing companies in this region, helping them to expand their sites and/or increase their employees, as well as with out -of-state companies looking to relocate or add facilities in Northeast Tennessee.

She stated that Tennessee has identified 12 target markets representing industry segments that fit well with the state's existing companies and growth plans, and regional directors like Tully assist in both the proposals and the specialized help on the ground once agreements are signed.

She reviewed recent local projects, including John Deere, Tennessee Hills, and Snap-on Tools, and also shared a five-year pipeline dashboard for potential and approved projects in various stages of planning. She also discussed the many ways the Department supports workforce development—in the schools, through apprenticeship programs and ongoing job training.

Paul closed the meeting with a recitation of the Four-Way Test.


#### Kennedy School Pollinator Garden Maintenance

• A variety of opportunities to get involved. Whether you're passionate about local community service, international projects, or developing leadership skills, there's a place for you here. I remember talking to a new member who joined because she was clearly drawn to our clean water initiatives abroad. For you, it might be the local food bank drives that resonate. This diversity of action keeps things interesting and allows people to contribute in ways that truly matter to them.

- An energy and innovation. There's a willingness to try new things different meeting formats, engaging online presence, and creative fundraising ideas. It feels like our district isn't stuck in the past but is constantly looking for ways to be relevant and impactful in today's world. I recently visited a club that started a mentorship program for young entrepreneurs, and it was buzzing with excitement!
- A shared sense of purpose. We're all here because we believe in Service Above Self. That's not just a



motto; it's something I see in action every day, from the small acts of kindness to the large-scale projects. That shared commitment creates a powerful bond and a feeling that you're part of something bigger than yourself.

Of course, none of this happens in a vacuum. We've got great leadership at the district level that encourages collaboration and provides resources to help clubs thrive.
