Rotarians are know for their generosity of both their time and their financial contributions., especially during this COVID-19 Pandemic. On February 6th, Jan Rowley and Carol Woodward volunteered at two of the six COVID vaccination clinics hosted throughout the Crater Health District areas. Jan was at Cavalier Square where the Pfizer vaccine was administered and Carol at the Prince George High School which was dispensing the Moderna vaccine. Donald Hunter was the supervisor at the High School and his son, Donnie, was in charge at the Hopewell site.

Vaccination clinics will continue and will significantly boost the level of fully vaccinated folks in the District. Rembmer that both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines require two shots, three weeks or four weeks apart respectively, Currently, those who are being vaccinated are in the 1a and 1b categories. More information can be found on the <u>Crater Health District Website</u>.

Vaccination appointments must be made in advance by getting on the Crater Health Dstrct Wait List, or by contacting your health care provider. Soon some CVS pharmacies will be scheduling vaccinations particularly for older people with comorbidities. Currently, only people in the 1a and 1b categories established by the CDC will be eligible for vaccinations until more vaccine is available. The landscape will be changeing rapidly as more vaccines become available. To help provide up to date information, Prince George County is creating a hotline, staffed by trained volunteeers. A number of Prince George Rotarians will be pulling recurring shifts as hotline vounteers. Among those Rotary Volunteeers will be Jan Rowley, Mary Ford, Donna Street, and Carol Woodward. Even as we increase the number of fully vaccinated persons, we will still need to wear masks, socially distance, and wash, wash those hands.

We offer prevention programs such as 'Safe Dates' for middle grade to high school students and 'Map the Way' for elementary school students. Our highly interactive, motivational programs for groups encourage youth to explore topics such as self-expression, self-esteem and feelings, healthy relationships, bullying and peer pressure, self-care and safety, and social/coping skills.

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month and we post on social media in support of the cause to remind the community that we are here to help with advocacy and education to stop dating abuse before it starts. ## **Covid Impact on Regional Economy**

Many of the impacts of COVID will be long lasting, as related by Prince George Rotarian, Renee Chapline, from data provided by the Richmond Federal Reserve. Over the past 11 months- since the coronavirus pandemic started to impact the U.S. economy and our local business and industries, the Richmond Fed has published numerous reports on the results of our <u>Fifth District business surveys</u>. At the end of 2020 many local businesses are still struggling with revenues, supply chain, and an available workforce to meet their daily operational needs. The Richmond Federal Reserve reported in December that less that 50% of businesses have returned to pre-COVID-19 in terms of employment, revenue and investment. Most businesses are reporting their activity at 80%, as they continue to struggle with keys issues related to the pandemic. Anecdotal information collected by the Richmond Fed indicates that for many firms, the vaccine has provided a light at the end of the tunnel, although they are not sure when the tunnel will end and how their business will look at the end of it. Survey results indicates 15% of firms surveyed in December 2020 indicated they will not return to the pre-COVID-19 employment levels. These companies are enjoying comparable profits with reductions in labor costs.

The coronavirus overturned the longest post-WWII expansion and growth boom, and created considerable hardship for Fifth District households and businesses. Companies in the region remain unsure as to when they will return to their pre-COVID activity and, in fact, many are anticipating permanent changes to their business models. Hopefully, broad vaccine distribution will encourage companies to invest and spur new employments opportunities in this new normal.

Together we can make a contribution to our local businesses by supporting our regional economy. Every time we make a purchase locally, we are creating more opportunities for local employment for our friends and neighbors. By putting money back into the community, you will see the fabric of the community prosper with innovation and resilience.
