DR. Warren Eugene Milteer, Jr., to speak on Black History

The speaker at our hybrid meeting tomorrow, Wednesday, February 1, will be Dr. Warren Eugene Milteer, Jr., one of Mable's cousins. Warren has published two widely acclaimed books on Black history. The following notation was taken from his home page.



Warren Eugene Milteer, Jr. is an assistant professor of history at the George Washington University. He received his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 2014. His publications include two academic books, Beyond Slavery's Shadow: Free People of Color in the South (UNC Press, 2021) and North Carolina's Free People of Color, 1715-1885 (LSU Press, 2020), the independently published Hertford County, North Carolina's Free People of Color and Their Descendants (2016), as well as articles in the Journal of Social History and the North Carolina Historical Review. Milteer was the recipient of the Southern Historical Association's Charles S. Sydnor Award for the best book in Southern history in 2022, the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association's Ragan Old North State Award for nonfiction in 2022, and the Historical Society of North Carolina's R. D. W. Connor Award in 2014 and 2016 for the best journal article in the North Carolina Historical Review.

Mable Combo Farris, the program host for the meeting tomorrow, is an active member of the Rotary Club of Prince George County and is the Commander of the American Legion Post, Prince George 1703.

Checking Your Go Bag - Checking on your neighbors

One of the most important things you can do for yourself or your family is to be prepared if a disaster comes your way.

This should include having a plan that includes a place to meet, to shelter in place, and a "Go Bag" to grab if you need to evacuate your home. Your Go Bag will need to include financial records, snacks, water, first aid supplies, tarps, blankets, etc. And, if you have a pet, you need a "Go Bag" for your pet with any prescriptions, food, water, treats, and medical records.

ESSENTIAL ITEMS FOR GO BAGS

- · Some cash and a list of bank accounts
- Copies of important documents
- Also keep copies elsewhere
- Flash drive with crucial files
- Comfort items (such as games)
- Change of clothes
- Batteries
- · Gloves
- Snacks and water
- List of allergies
- Cell phones and chargers
- A solar powered cooler bag for medication



How much more complicated can it be for a family that includes someone with a disability that limits access? I recently participated in a FREE training that anyone can access by going to FEMA.org. The webinar was tailored for anyone in the public to plan, prepare, and respectfully assist neighbors survive any sort of emergency.

I found out about the webinar through my participation in the local Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) but anyone can go to the FEMA website and access many informational programs on preparing for emergencies.

I was interested in the program on assisting families with members with limited access to help plan for effective and respectful communication.

There were great tips on using communication boards to assess needs from people who may not speak English or be able to communicate their needs in verbal ways. There was also a list of resources available in some communities that can assist with transportation and interpreter needs. I feel energized to share the information with my neighbors and with the PG CERT Team.

Please consider using the resources at FEMA.org and having a conversation with vulnerable neighbors. And, for goodness sakes, check your personal/family Go Bag, so you are prepared for bad weather or a chemical spill or other natural/man-made emergency.


Grant Management Seminars

The 2023 Grant Management Seminars have been scheduled for 2023. Any club which wishes to apply for or partner in a Rotary grant must have at least one member attend one of the GMS sessions. Again, this year, the District 7600 GMS sessions are virtual and free. A GMS takes only about 2 hours of a person's time and there is so much to learn, especially if one is new or newer to Rotary or to Rotary grants.

Currently, our club is a partner is a multi-club district grant with Hopewell, Colonial Heights, Petersburg, and Petersburg Breakfast Rotary Clubs to install permeable, erosion mitigating parking materials at the Rotary Park on Pocahontas Island and at the Appomattox River Regional Park (ARRP). The involvement of Rotary with ARRP began in 2011 with a district grant the club was awarded to install the first public canoe/kayak launch on the Appomattox River. Since then, in partnership with other clubs, we have installed a comfort stations, landscaping, signage, and other amenities at the park.
