

Our increase in membership recently is due to a number of things.....some by chance and some by design.

1) The Covid-19 pandemic made everyone more aware of all things around us. Thus an organization like Rotary stands out brightly....and we did. We have had 3 huge successful food drives that both raised awareness of the need for food for many families in Fluvanna County and showed the many good things that the Fluvanna County Rotary Club does to help our fellowmen. There was a lot of publicity both in print and TV coverage that we received. Some of our new members came from people that volunteered in the food drive events.

2) We made a concerted effort to reach out to our friends and family in our county to tell them about all the reasons that they should consider membership in our Rotary Club.

3) Again because of the pandemic we chose to go to all Zoom meetings weekly which made it much easier for people to attend meetings from the comfort of their homes. The attendance at those meetings drew many residents which in turn gave us several of our new members.

The Rotary Satellite Club of James City County was established 3+ years ago to offer an alternative meeting day, time, location, operating model and a different price point. The sponsor club meets for breakfast; satellite club meets in the evening but doesn't eat together.

Different meeting times give Rotarians options to attend either meeting for make-up or for fellowship. Flexibility of having two clubs has saved some Rotarians whose work schedules no longer allow them to participate in the sponsor (legacy) club. We don't compete for members; we find the right fit, even if it's a different club.

We've built a strong synergy between the sponsor and Satellite clubs: we fundraise together, work community service events together, share a mentorship program, and collaborate on our Public Image efforts (consistent messaging). We share a Rotary webpage but have separate Facebook pages). Club cultures are a bit different, however, we have more in common that we have differences.

Our Satellite Club set a very aggressive net membership growth goal of +7 for Rotary Year 20-21, particularly with the challenging pandemic and we are currently at +6. If you don't have a plan, you won't get there. We used a simple two pronged approach: retain and engage current members and recruit new members. They won't care how much you know until they know how much you care.

We continuously seek ideas from Rotarians for local causes we can support to engage our members, increase their buy-in, and increase our awareness of community needs. We search for service projects that meet the community's needs (i.e., increased feeding capacity) and that are appealing to most Rotarians. We adopted a local Title I elementary school which is a worthy cause and has great visibility in the community.

We intentionally strive to be diverse in many ways, to reflect our community populace and appeal to newcomers. When possible, we tailor our events to be family-friendly.

We invite prospective members to join us at community service events and ask them what Rotary can do for them. We emphasize that we're looking for a relationship, not a date. And then we follow up, follow up, follow up.

Simply stated, we seek meaningful, enduring service projects where members can contribute, grow, have fun, and let it show. Enthusiasm, drive, passion and dedication are contagious internally and externally.

One of Goochland Rotary's area of focus is supporting education by encouraging children to read. For the third year, Goochland Rotary was able to provide every 4th grade student in the Goochland County Public Schools their own hard-back copy of the *Wonder* by R. J. Palacio.

If you have not seen the movie or read the book, the story is about a boy named Auggie who has been home schooled because of a facial deformity, and his parents wanted to protect him. As he gets older, he and his parents agree it is time for him to go to school with other kids and he starts his first year in Beecher Prep School in the 5th grade. This is a funny and incredibly moving novel about Auggie's adjustment to going to school for the first time, making friends and the students learning to accept him.

In part of the story, one of the teacher's explains to the kids about having a precept to guide them in their life and in making their decisions. Rotary also has a precept to guide us Rotarians. It is known as the 4-Way Test.

Of the things we think, say, or do -

1. Is it the Truth?
2. Is it Fair to all concerned?
3. Will it build Goodwill and Better Friendships?
4. Will it be Beneficial to all concerned?

A label is included in each book with this test.

This year's distribution process was modified to follow Goochland County Public Schools' COVID-19 Health Plan, which did not allow us to distribute the books to the students in person. Instead, this year, Rotarian Robin Hillman prepared a video

with our Rotary Club message that was played for the students and then Rotarian Dr. Raley handed out the books to each student. We missed seeing the children's excitement in person when they received the book. But Dr. Raley collected great pictures of the students receiving the books. Those pictures have been included here for your enjoyment.

As many of you are aware, COVID-19 continues to stress homeless shelters across our Rotary District. With social distancing requirements, many shelters are operating at a fraction of their total capacity. This reality has left many individuals out on the streets and in the elements. To help individuals who can't get shelter, **we plan to purchase 200 ponchos made from recycled plastics for our Spring service project.** These ponchos will be delivered to the Salvation Army in Norfolk and Richmond. In the event that shelter is unavailable, these ponchos will help keep individuals and their valuables dry.

Message from Stephen Beer:

As we are getting closer to the end of this Rotary year, I have been reflecting on all the good our clubs are doing for our communities and around the world this past year.

Looking ahead, we have many new service projects in the works, too.

Our clubs stepped up to respond quickly to the immediate needs in our communities because of the coronavirus. We increased capacity at local food pantries, provided personal protective gear and fulfilled other immediate needs. The deadline for clubs to apply for this coming year's District Grant is May 15.

Several clubs are working on new Global Grant projects. The Oyster Point Rotary is developing a water project with Rotary clubs in Accra, Ghana. The Chesapeake Rotary is partnering with clubs in Kolkata, India to provide open heart surgeries to impoverished children in India and nearby countries. The Rotary Club of West Richmond is continuing its support of The World Pediatric Project to fund another neonatal care program in the Caribbean. You may recall The World Pediatric Project, formerly known as the International Hospital for Children, was started by Rotarians in the South Richmond Rotary Club.

So, if you have not yet done so, please don't forget to make your contribution to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund. It's easy to do online at my.rotary.org. After you log in, hit the donate button on the home page, then follow the prompts. For some of us, writing a check is still the preferred way to give. Help your club meet its giving goal for this year. But, more importantly, help Rotary fund our future humanitarian projects locally and elsewhere! Did you know that if your club's giving (which includes their members' giving) to the Polio fund is greater than last year's giving, the total amount will be matched nine to one! There are only a few weeks left to attain this incredible match. Please make sure your polio funds are sent to The Rotary Foundation before the end of May.

Finally, I want to thank everyone who participated in the Giving Tuesday campaign earlier in April. We had an incredible \$79,858 donated on that day! That was a 25.8% increase over last year.

District Grants and the Ides of May

The 2020-2021 Rotary Grants year demonstrated how Rotary District 7600 and other Rotary districts across the globe met the COVID challenge. Our district hosted district grants and COVID 2019 Emergency grants for a total budget of approximately \$240,000 of district designated funds and other funding from clubs and partnering organizations.

Our clubs met the challenge when 55 of our 61 clubs attended the Grants Management Seminars (GMS) to become eligible to apply for districts for the 2021-2021 Rotary year. Applications for these grants are due to the district grants committee by May 15 via the district grants module in dacdb.com.

This is a work in progress. A number of clubs have submitted drafts to the module to-date for total project funding of \$38,000 of club, partnering organizations, and district designated funds. This coming year District 7600 has only \$130,000 of district designated funds for club grants, but the clubs will be creative in designing impactful grant projects and seeking partners. More clubs will be submitting their applications in the next couple of weeks as they develop their project proposals and budgets. Watch this space.



SERVE TO CHANGE LIVES

All of this is against a backdrop of challenges to club fundraising efforts and limits on the ability of club volunteers finalize the clubs' 2019-2020 district grant projects. These stalwart clubs are weathering the COVID-19 challenges and the district is anticipating novel proposals for district grant projects.
