



This month's theme is fellowship. These books (two novels and a memoir) focus on friendship, a close form of fellowship.


<u>My Brilliant Friend,</u> by Elena Ferrante. The first in a highly praised series spanning nearly 60 years, that is now an HBO miniseries. In 1950s Naples, fiery Lila and bookish Elena become friends at ten years old. This first book follows that friendship through adolescence.

The Keeper of Lost Things, by Ruth Hogan. I keep a list of my five favorite books and this is on it. Anthony Peardew lost a keepsake from his fiancée, who died unexpectedly that day. For the rest of his life, he sought consolation in rescuing objects others misplaced. He bequeaths his estate to his assistant, Laura, who is recovering from a bad divorce. Laura moves into his mansion and finds new friends, who join her in realizing Anthony's last wish: reuniting his lost objects with their owners.

<u>Tuesdays With Morrie</u>, by Mitch Albom. A classic, this memoir is written by a man who lost touch with his college professor and mentor until he encountered Morrie again in the last months of Morrie's life. Mitch visited Morrie in his study every Tuesday, just as they did in college. Their rekindled relationship became a lesson in how to live.
