### September is Basic Education and Literacy Month

During September, Rotary International (RI) focuses on basic education and literacy. According to RI, a key goal for Rotarians is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. The Rotary Foundation supports education through schools, donations, and service projects around the world.

As McLean Rotarians, we are doing our part to enhance basic education and literacy and to address disparities in learning. Here are a few examples of our recent contributions:

Bringing the joy of reading to children. We continue to provide books and read to children, pre-K-3rd grade, at Timber Lane Elementary School. These books often represent the first books owned by these children and their families, representing 22 countries and 34 different languages.

Providing local student scholarships, activities, leadership, financial During the past 12 years the McLean contributions, and grant support, Rotary Scholarship program has continue to address educational and awarded more than \$100,000 in literacy needs in the community and college scholarships to local students overseas. Many of these projects also who demonstrate academic promise and financial need.

Ensuring a good start for preschoolers. Our foundation grant dollars support the Falls Church-McLean Children's Center healthy nutrition program, and Kidstretch, a preschool program of Homestretch, which assists families to transition from homelessness to independence. Ten years ago, a McLean Rotary grant helped start Kidstretch.

Supporting students and schools in Africa. Our grants and individual donations benefit MicheLo programs at a school for students with disabilities in eSwatini: building a school and clinic in eSwatini under the auspices of Aspire African Communities: water, sanitation, and hygiene projects by the District 7610 Strategic Water Alliance enabling schools to open and operate throughout Zambia; scholarships and hygiene projects provided to girls in West Africa to enable their attendance at school through the auspices of the Global Woman P.E.A.C.E. Foundation; and fostering the economic independence of women artisans in Rwanda, including refugee women from other countries, through the educational and vocational training programs of Indigo Africa. A possible new partnership on the horizon is with the Julie Tiatt Lutheran School in Liberia.

### Brad Swanson: The Myth of Doing Well by Doing Good August 8, 2023

"We all want to invest our money so that it earns both financial returns and makes the world a better place". One popular way to try to do this is to invest in ESG funds (Environmental-Social-Governance). However, Swanson's research has shown that these funds do not work as expected. Investment analysts in 2004 created the term "ESG" to judge the risks of investing in these types of companies. The problem is they are graded on profitability, not on making the world a better place. The fact, is they neither deliver better social performance nor better stock price performance, and management fees are often higher.

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> Tobacco companies and those that produce fossil fuels, may be included as they score at or above average on the ESG risk assessment.

There are socially responsible mutual funds, which exclude or screen companies that may contribute to environmental degradation, political repression, and poor working conditions. There are also "mod" funds liked Calvert Impact Capital that specialize in investing in companies that will have maximum social impact. However, investors have to accept that returns in these funds may be below market rate.

While there are many people who can help someone research their family history, the most qualified ones are either board certified or accredited; Nicki is one of only 500 certified genealogists in the US. She also explained the six general categories of lineage societies; i.e., organizations of people who can prove lineal descent from a qualifying ancestor. There are over 500 lineage societies in the US.



Aaron Moore Exec, Director, VHC Medical Brigade. August 22, 2023

Founded in 1999, by Mclean Rotarian, Dr. Barry Beyer, the Medical Brigade works exclusively in Honduras, bringing health care, medical treatments and training to indigenous people in remote rural areas. They help build clinics, supply medical equipment and training for local volunteers. The medical program includes diagnosis and treatment of diseases, surgeries, optical care and physical therapy. In partnership with government, village leaders and Rotary International they have empowered local villagers to build and maintain a McLean Rotary

sustainable source of clean water and sanitation. The Rotaries of LaPaz and McLean have partnered in this long term program in hard to reach communities with little or no access to healthcare. It has provided clean water by connecting entire communities. They provide health screening and education in rural schools. Screening includes deworming, dental education and providing a school lunch program.

The Brigade also supports education through school nutrition and leadership training.

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### Carmen Wu with Deborah Jackson and Carol Robinson 08-29-2023 Membership and Service Learning

Deborah Jackson introduced today's speaker, fellow Rotarian Carol Robinson from the Chantilly-Centreville Club. The theme of the presentation was "Membership and Service Learning Create Hope in the World," and both Deborah and Carol led this interactive discussion.

After reminding those present of Rotary's seven goals – World Peace, Economic Development, Water and Sanitation, Maternal Child Health. Disease Protection, Education, and the Environment – Deborah and Carol walked attendees through a Venn Diagram of "Service Learning," "Create Hope in the World," and "Gift/Value." Attendees individually wrote about how Rotary contributes to Service Learning, and then discussed their answer with the person next to them. The same exercise was conducted for Create Hope for the World (how does Rotary create hope), and then finally, Gift/Value (list three values that Rotary

means for you). The final exercise was a "paired verbal fluency" during which each attendee paired up with someone from a separate table and took turns making an "elevator speech" completing one of two questions: (i) "Rotary is..." or (ii) "My Club is....". Increasingly shorter time periods were given to each participant, helping all to develop a more focused statement about Rotary's contributions domestically and internationally, and the value that each member gains from being a Rotarian.
