Disease Prevention and Treatment Month of December

The prevention and treatment disease is a major focus of Rotary. Interrelated with this are the Rotary focus areas of Maternal and Child Health, Water and Sanitation, and Support for the Environment. At any given time, Rotarians around the world are initiating and supporting hundreds of projects that address the prevention and treatment of both chronic and infectious diseases: promote health through health education, health screenings. vaccination programs, and other preventive measures: infrastructure for clean water. hygiene, and sanitation facilities; and support the training of medical, dental. and allied health professionals. The overall goal of these initiatives is to combat disease and help improve the health, wellbeing, and quality of life of people worldwide.

Rotary International has provided over \$65 million in grants to help fight disease.
