Nancy Scull Speaks To Us

Nancy Scull spoke of how she had been invited to a Rotary meeting, liked what she saw and soon decided to join. She has always been interested in community service. Her father paid for her education, and she wants to help some of the many people who do not have that advantage.



She said she had worked for many years for the Federal Housing Opportunities Commission, and there was a huge need nationwide for

subsidized housing. Montgomery County is not an exception. Later, she was President of **Silver Spring Help** and realized there was hunger in Montgomery County, which county leaders were denying. Some in the faith community organized a meeting to talk about hunger, and **200 people** attended.

Part of Nancy's response to this was to found **Shepherd's Table**, in 1983. It began in a church and provided food and other services, including counseling. Now, it has its own building, which features a small number of personal living quarters (PLQs).

If we heard this right, Nancy has a daughter who is a tax expert in her father's law firm. Also, she has adopted two nephews to help them get a good start in life. More descendants? Yes. Her family continues to grow.

She now works with the **Bernie Scholarship** program, which helps low income people in Montgomery County to pay for their college education. Many don't even think about college because no one in their families has attended or, in some cases, they are immigrants and don't know how to apply to schools and obtaining financing in the U.S. "Bernie helps people **believe** they can get better," she said.

The Bernie program tries to provide a tutor for every student it helps - about 60 per year, and **tutors are needed**. Any of us can do this.

Then Nancy's talk got personal and, therefore, more interesting. She loves **sailing** small boats and is a **mountain bike** enthusiast who has ridden in several countries. She has loved her two trips to New Zealand and has been to two weddings in France. Going to the first one, she and her husband got lost and arrived late. Going to the second, they had car trouble and arrived to the wedding in a **tow truck**.

On a **skiing** trip near Davos, Switzerland, they saw a storm coming, bought chains for their rental car and headed up to the pass. At higher altitude, the road was a sheet of ice, and the chains wouldn't fit. A tow truck got them to the top, where they crept along, hugging the mountain (as opposed to the drop-off on the other side of the road) until they came to a parked car they could not get around. Undaunted, they skied down and found their lodging place, around 2:00 a.m. Three days later, they hiked up and retrieved their car.

There were more stories to tell, but time ran out. Now, we know much more about our new member. Welcome, Nancy!
