

He has been looking at cancer cells and immune cells in connection with immune therapy. He spends his days counting T-cells under a microscope. The project began in March and is going well. He will be coming back



to Hopkins in February to help finish the project. It is hoped the National Cancer Institute will publish the results in six to twelve months. Matt plans to take the MCAT next April and apply to medical school in May.
