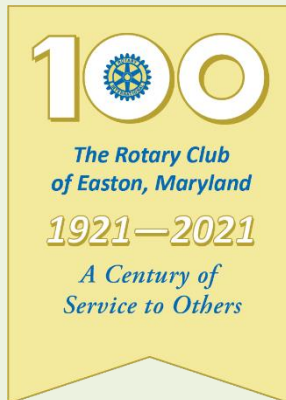

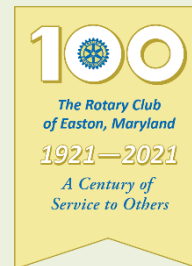
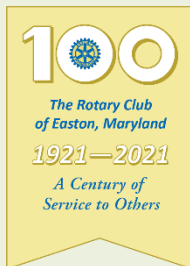


## *My Rotary Story* *by Jed Anthony*



There are two things that were pre-determined for me prior to my birth: 1) I would be a New York Yankees fan, and 2) One way or another, the Easton Rotary Club would play an important role in my life.

I was born in 1976, and at that time my Grandfather (J. Howard Anthony) and Father (Jack Anthony) were both active members of the Easton Rotary Club. A few years later my Uncle (Joe Anthony) would also join the club. I have distant memories of attending Rotary meetings with my Dad during “Family Day” and standing nervously by his side when he introduced me to the club. Those memories are mixed with the emotions of pride and a little bit of fear, as I never truly knew what my Dad was going to say about me during that introduction!

I also remember a feeling of comfort, as I could distinctly tell that everyone I met, sat next to for lunch, or watched my Dad speak with, was genuinely happy to be at that meeting. I didn’t understand at the time why they were so happy to be there and what they all really did together, but I did know that whatever it was must be important.

When I was nine years old, I had the pleasure of putting on the distinct maroon jersey of the Rotary Easton Little League team. I had watched my older brother wear this uniform for four years prior to my chance, and always knew that Rotary was going to be “my team.” There was something different about wearing the Rotary name across my chest. Don’t get me wrong, the Elks, Lions, Jaycees, and VFW were fine teams too, but I knew what Rotary was and I knew who Rotary represented; Rotary was more than just a team name, it stood for something much more. It also didn’t hurt that we had a really good team! In my four years playing for Rotary, we went to the Championship series each year, losing twice and winning twice.

In high school, my trips to the Rotary meetings were less and less. As I am finding out in my own life right now ... teenagers are not as excited to spend time having lunch with a group of “old people!” However, Rotary was always around our house as my Dad would regularly tell us about the speakers he heard at that week’s meeting and what other things he learned from his Rotarian friends. I also had the pleasure of meeting and becoming brief friends with at least three fellow students who were attending Easton High School as part of the Rotary Youth Exchange program. These students always spoke about the opportunity the Rotary Club had given them and how grateful they were to these families.

The next seasons of my life flew by without a lot of direct interaction with Rotary, as I went to college, began a career, stopped a career, moved back home, started a new job, moved out again, and then met an amazing woman who would become my wife. It was time to settle down and buy a house, but I didn’t know where to begin.

Thankfully, my Dad knew just where to go for assistance – the Easton Rotary Club. There he found a fellow Rotarian that was willing to help a young professional navigate through the home buying and mortgage process. During our brief meeting, that Rotarian saw something that made him think there was a place for me in his organization. Shortly after settling on my house, Mr. Buck Duncan reached back out to me and asked, “if I had ever thought about being a banker?”

That one simple question ... which I respectfully answered “No, but I’m willing to listen,” provided me with an opportunity to begin a new career and to find Rotary back once again in my life.

Upon establishing myself in the local business world, I was asked to attend some Rotary meetings as a guest and then was offered the opportunity to apply for membership. The whole time my Dad was there to lend support, but at the same time making sure that becoming a Rotarian was my choice and not based on his influence. But as I mentioned earlier, becoming an Easton Rotarian was pre-determined for me, so the choice was easy and the chance to join was an honor of high value.

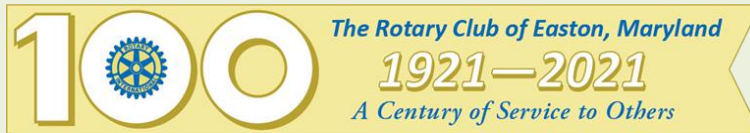
Even though my membership was seemingly destined for me since I was a young child, my evolution to being a true Rotarian took a few years longer. As with a lot of new members, it takes a little while to feel comfortable joining a club with such exceptional members and history. I volunteered for an event or two, went to some meetings, and even took a leave of absence for a few months. I was a member of the club but hadn't fully committed, until given the chance to listen and learn from one of our club's outstanding members – Mr. Tim Kagan.

Tim's bravery, thoughtfulness, unending generosity, and quiet leadership during his year as our Club President became a true inspiration for me. I thought I knew what Rotary was about, since I had been around it my whole life, yet I saw Rotary and our club through a different lens when watching Tim lead. I learned that if I wanted to be a Rotarian attending meetings was not enough, I had to really get involved. I didn't necessarily have to be on every committee, or speak the loudest at every meeting, but what I had to do was give back as much as I could, and as best as I could ... Tim showed me how that could be done.

Shortly after this internal revelation, George Hatcher met with me to discuss taking on some of the leadership roles of the club and eventually becoming President. I was extremely humbled and honored to be asked and did not take the opportunity lightly. For accepting the responsibility of leading the Easton Rotary Club was one of great privilege, especially knowing that I was to follow in the generational footsteps of my Grandfather, Father and Uncle ... all Past Presidents of our club.

Yes, the Easton Rotary Club has been with me since I was born, but for the last 15 years it has truly become a part of who I am. I have been able to sit with my Dad almost weekly for lunch, I deliver meals on wheels each month with my brother, I've packed meals for the hungry with my wife and daughter, and I've raised hundreds of Flags with my son and his teammates.

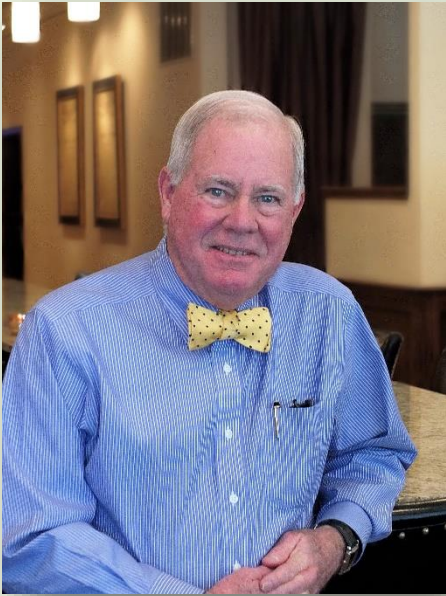
Rotary is an amazing International service organization made up of an outstanding group of men and women, but to me our Easton Rotary Club is much, much more ... to me it is family.

*Meals on Wheels is a boost to my psyche! I know I'm doing something good.*

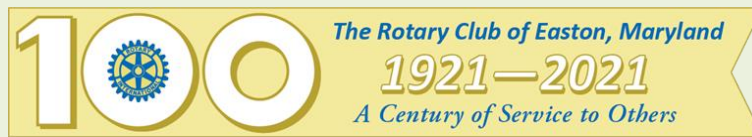
*When I first started with Flags for Heroes, I got goosebumps listening to all the horns honking as we were putting the flags in the ground, and I still do.*

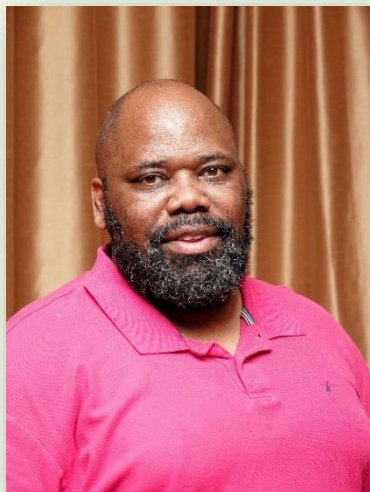




## *Casey on the Rotary Club of Easton*

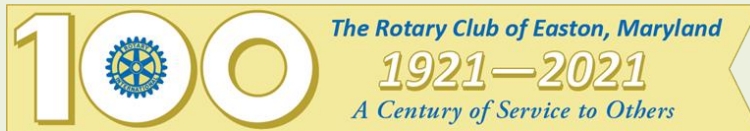

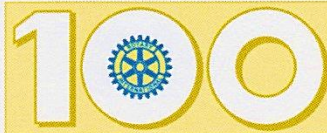
## *A Debt of Gratitude*
