



On September 1, 1921, the Rotary Club made history by becoming the first Rotary Club in the world in a town of fewer than 10,000 people. Sam Shannahan

In researching the history of the Rotary Club of Easton, I found the front page of *The Star Democrat* from Friday, December 11, 1942. It was devoted almost entirely to the death of Samuel E. Shannahan. Now Sam was a great many things to our community, and the outpouring of love for him was quite remarkable. First and foremost, he was the owner and editor of *The Star Democrat*, but he was also involved in nearly every civic activity in Easton and Talbot County. All of this is significant, but most significant for Easton Rotarians is that he was the "founder and father" of our club. Here's what his contemporaries and fellow Rotarians said of him, in part, in a resolution that appeared on that front page:

It is as a Rotarian and as the founder of the Rotary Club of Easton that we, his fellow members, would especially stress the exemplary character and accomplishments of our distinguished fellow member whom we all (of whatever age) felt privileged to call familiarly and with affection, "Sam."

More than twenty-one years ago, our fellow member, Sam, conceived the idea that the community of Easton would be materially benefitted if a Rotary Club might be organized here to comprise a cross section of the business and professional activities of the town.

Not only did he conceive this idea, but he also inspired others who were stimulated into the concerted action that culminated in the organization of this Rotary Club in Easton, whose purpose is best explained in its motto of "Service above Self."

And the idea of improving local communities by improving standards of business and professional practices as fostered by Rotary Clubs which moved Sam to see to it that such a Club with such a salutary influence should be established here in Easton, resulted also in the creation, under his leadership, of several other Rotary Clubs in the towns of the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

Sam Shannahan is, therefore, not only the founder and father of the Easton Rotary Club but has also been given the well-deserved recognition of having promoted the ideal of service as a worthy motive in the several other communities on the Eastern Shore which have Rotary Clubs because of his interest and aggressive action.

He was the Secretary-Treasurer of the Easton Rotary Club for several years and is the only person to have been elected to serve as its president for two successive years.

Ever since the Rotary Club was organized, he has been a constant inspiration and guide in its growth and in its activities for community betterment.

Over the next couple of years as we approach our Centennial, we will learn more about Sam Shannahan—what he thought and how he approached life. We will revive and keep his spirit with us as we venture into the next century of service to others. To know where we're going, we need to fully appreciate where we've been and where we came from. Sam will help us on that journey.

After Kim and I searched Spring Hill Cemetery for hours last Saturday for Sam's grave unsuccessfully, we contacted Dana Newman and the Talbot County Free Library's Maryland Room, and they provided the exact location. Today, I laid a wreath there and promised him that our club will always be true to its founding and that we would always look to better our community and lend a helping hand to those in need.

Samuel Shannahan died while working at his desk at *The Star Democrat* on December 7, 1942, at the age of 69. That was exactly one year after Pearl Harbor and almost exactly 77 years ago today. We will always remember.

Harold Baines - Hero

What exactly is a hero? The Oxford Dictionary defines hero as "a person who is admired or idealized for courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities." As Rotarians, when we look for inspiration to continue our service to others, we need look no further than Harold Baines. When we wonder whether we are up to the challenges life has to offer in Rotary and in our personal and work situations, Harold Baines stands as an example to us all. His Baseball Hall of Fame writeup is on the next page, but that's only part of the story- the baseball part. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2019, but if there were one, he would be in the Talbot County Hall of Fame, too. He grew up here and still lives here. He had a baseball career most players could only dream of. He's the very definition of a "good man" and "hero." Is he admired for his courage, outstanding achievements, and noble qualities? Absolutely. Although he is a "star," he's never acted as though he's better than anyone else. In fact, it's quite the opposite, and he never fails to share his love of baseball and life with anyone who asks. He's always given back to his hometown. He's the sort of person you just like to be around. His career was far from easy, but you never know that to watch him. He embodies Rotary's 4-Way Test in dealing with others, and I've watched it firsthand during Little League games when my son was playing and at Easton Ford when he represented us for a while in the 1990s. He's inspired me, and when he spoke with my son and his team, it was a magical thing to watch. How many times is a true baseball hero in our midst? And how many times is he a "regular guy?" Rarely. So, he when he touches others, it means something, and that's just what we as Rotarians can do if we do the same thing by lending a helping hand. And how cool is it that Harold Baines is President Andrew's father-in-law? Wow!



Harold Baines - Class of 2019

At its most basic level, baseball is a hitter's game. Hits equal runs, and runs equal wins. And at every turn, Harold Baines parlayed his ability to hit into baseball stardom. "The guy could flat-out hit," said Hall of Famer Brooks Robinson. Baines began his professional baseball career as the No. 1 pick in the 1977 amateur draft by the Chicago White Sox. As the story goes, future Hall of Fame owner Bill Veeck first saw Baines at a Little League game when he was 12, then followed his career until he was eligible for the draft. "I must've had a pretty decent day in Little League that day," Baines said. Baines quickly worked his way through the White Sox system, surfacing in the majors in 1980 as young manager Tony La Russa was assembling a future division winner. By 1982, Baines - an outfielder - was receiving American League Most Valuable Player votes after hitting 25 homers and driving in 105 runs during that season. Over the following five seasons, Baines was named to three All-Star teams while averaging 22 homers and 97 RBI. He led the White Sox to the 1983 American League West title - the Sox's first postseason appearance since 1959. As he reached age 30, he quickly became a baseball version of lineup problem-solver. Traded to the Rangers in the middle of the 1989 season in the Sammy Sosa deal, Baines developed a reputation as a player who could help any team during the stretch drive – and one of the best designated hitters in the game. Baines appeared in 1,643 of his 2,830 big league games as a DH, making only 63 appearances in the field from 1989 until the end of his career. But from 1980-86, Baines played only five games at DH while establishing himself as one of baseball's most dependable right fielders. "I guess that's when I realized that it was a business," said Baines of the trade from the White Sox. "Everybody's not as fortunate as Cal Ripken to stay in one city his whole career." The Rangers sent Baines to the A's in 1990, where he helped Oakland win the American League pennant. Baines homered in the World Series against the Reds, but Cincinnati swept Oakland. "I had one goal: To get a World Series ring," said Baines, who hit .324 in eight Postseason series. "I never got there. On paper, we had a better team (than the Reds in 1990). So that'll tell you right there that you don't know." Baines moved to the Orioles for two seasons (1994-95), then back to the White Sox, back to the Orioles - then onto Cleveland before more stops with Baltimore and the White Sox - with whom he ended his career in 2001. The final tally: 2,866 hits and 1,628 RBI, to go along with 384 home runs, a .289 batting average and six All-Star Game selections. Baines was elected to the Hall of Fame in 2019.

We raised \$952 for the Blood Bank through individual and club monetary donations.


Division winners were based on membership size as of July 1, 2022. I calculated the number of donations over membership size to determine a percentage. Division winners are:


I am extremely proud of the District's effort. I have presented plaques to each club to thank them for being heroes.
