LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

BRIAN TURNER'S ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICE



Mr. Turner is a returning speaker, having presented programs in the past during his four terms in NC House of Representatives District #116 in Buncombe County. Mr. Turner is currently the Policy Director Audubon of NC. In this role he works across the state and with numerous federal agencies to advocate for policies that are good for birds and ensure that laws are properly enforced.

Why do birds matter? Mr. Turner reminds us that in the early 1990s and even in the 1980s, canaries were used to detect problem gases in the mines. And today, animals and plants still serve as signals of problems in the environment.

He reported that research by Cornell University showed that in the past 50 years 30% of North America's bird population has died. The Audubon Society is dedicated to taking steps to reverse this trend and "bend the bird curve" to get the bird population back up.

Native plants and wetlands are a major focus area. Mr. Turner shared facts about the positive impact of native plants. Native plants = native bugs = food for birds.

Wetlands: Mr. Turner explained wetlands' importance in trapping pollution/sediment and preventing flooding.

What can Rotary do to help? Educate yourself and others by using apps like SEEK to identify native plants in an area. Use NC Native Plant society website to select plants that are appropriate. Visit National Audubon Society website to learn more about the issues. Visit and enjoy the Native Plants walk at Beaver Lake.



- The majority of hashtags on Instagram are branded hashtags
- Most people include hashtags in their captions, rather than in the <u>comment</u> section on Instagram
- A web marketing specialist called Chris Messina is the inventor of the hashtag.
- Biz Stone, who is the co-founder of Twitter, was fixing a technical issue around the social media network when Messina suggested that they use a hashtag.
- The first-ever hashtag that was used was #barcamp, which Messina sent on the 23rd of August 2007.
- The Oxford English Dictionary originally included the word 'hashtag' in 2014.

Dr. Mallory McDuff Speaks at Rotary

The Rotary Club of Tryon was very fortunate to have Mallory McDuff, Ph.D., Professor of Environmental Studies and Outdoor Leadership at Warren Wilson College, provide a very thought provoking presentation at last week's meeting.

Dr. McDuff spoke about sustainable practices around death and dying, the topic of her recent book Our Last Best Act.

Dr. McDuff was looking for an end of life plan that met three requirements: 1) it must be environmentally conscious, 2) it must be cost effective, 3) it must be something her family can agree to complete. McDuff explained to the Rotarians that what started as a personal journey to understanding the option for disposition of a body after death, expanded into a yearlong exploration of green burials, aquamation, conservation cemeteries, death doulas, home funerals, and human composting.

Joining her during the presentation was Conserving Carolina Executive Director Kieran Roe. Conserving Carolina is a proud supporter of Carolina Memorial Sanctuary, a conservation burial ground in Mills River, North Carolina. The sanctuary is an all-faiths burial ground, where people can be laid to rest, through green burial, burial of cremated remains, or scattering of ashes on land that is protected by a conservation easement through Conserving Carolina.

Rotary Club of Morganton Presents the 2023 Ohana Mud Run

Every August, just before the dreaded return to school and the proverbial end of summer for kids of all ages, the Rotary Club of Morganton partners with Alive Cubed to present the Ohana Mud Run. This year the event took place on Saturday, August 12, 2023. Held at the Bennick Compound, a private motocross facility outside of Morganton, NC, the Ohana Mud Run is the last hurrah for many families before the daily grind of the next school year drags them back toward autumn. Ohana, meaning "family" and "no one left behind", is a family / team obstacle run - in the mud, a LOT of mud with 16 unique team-based obstacles including rope crawls, big mud hills, river tubing, huge sprinklers, inflatables, other team challenges and tons of fun! Included along the way is all the laughing, the joy and the lifelong memories created while rolling around in the mud. And to top it all off, all the proceeds are used to support local needs and the club mission to provide service to our community.

Funds from the 2022 Ohana Mud Run were distributed to the following local organizations:

UNC Health Blue Ridge's Family Center and Special Care Nursery to distribute infant sleep safety kits with infant swaddles to promote infant safe sleep practices specifically focusing on the reduction of Sudden Infant Death

Burke County Public Schools Exceptional Children's Preschool Services to assist with the purchase of vision and hearing screening equipment to support the goal of conducting vision and hearing screenings for every preschool age student in the referral process to allow for early detection of disabilities needing special education services.

Grace Episcopal Church Backpack Ministry that provides backpacks to elementary school students facing food insecurity with 8 to 10 pounds of food bi-weekly to 140 students throughout the school year with a smaller amount of bags delivered through the summer months

Catawba Science Center's Little Scientists program which delivers in-class, hands-on science activities to underserved pre-K children in 21 classrooms in Burke County. The program is focused on STEM subjects using several learning methodologies and are designed to inspire, enhance and engage underserved Burke County children and their families in science-based interests and learning endeavors.

YMCA of Catawba Valley summer camps to fund two field trips during the summer camp to the Greensboro Science Center and the Nido & Mariana Qubein Children's Museum including expenses for transportation and admission to the museums. Funds also support

the purchase of STEAM kits for the participating students.

Rotary Club of Morganton loves staging this event every year - not only does it help raise funds for the community and the club, it gives us a forum to hear and share many special and inspiring stories from our participants, to create lifelong memories and to bring people closer together. Winterrowd Shares Experiences in Galapagos

Rotarian Stephanie Winterrowd entertained the Rotary Club of Tryon with stories from her time as a field Biologist in the Galapagos Islands. Stephanie was working on her master's degree in biology at Wake Forest University, when she spent nine months in the Galapagos Islands studying the Nazca Boobies.

Rotarians learned that working as a research biologist in the Galapogos Islands isn't a glamorous job. The temperatures are hot, the

work is tough, and the food and accommodations are very limited. Stephanie explained they couldn't have any food that contained seeds, to eliminate the possibility of introducing foreign plants to the island.

Her research focused on the unique feet of the Nazca Boobies, and it showed that the Nazca Boobies are one of only a few birds that incubate their eggs using their feet.

When asked how she went from studying birds in the Galapogos Islands to her current work at Edward Jones, Stephanie talked about the similarities in the jobs. The biology you learned in school was about plants and animals, but working as a research biologist is all about collecting and analyzing data. Now I help our customers manage their finances through careful analysis of financial data. The charts and graphs are about dollars instead of birds, but the careful analytical skills are the same.
