These notes mean the world to these veterans and are tangible and cherished mementos of the **Honor Flight experience**.



### **Program Last Week**

**Donna Ensley** introduced our speaker, **April Johnson-Burgess**, the Executive Director of Helpmate. Donna learned about Helpmate through the United Way and served on the Board for six years. She shared that domestic violence is real and can happen to anyone, regardless of race or socio-economic status.

Helpmate is working in our community to eliminate abuse and fear by providing safety, shelter and support for victims / survivors of intimate partner domestic violence. Johnson-Burgess shared how domestic violence shows up - by using coercion/threats, using intimidation and emotional abuse, using isolation, using children as leverage, using male privilege, using economic abuse and by minimizing, denying and blaming. All of these techniques are about power and control.

Helpmate provides the following free and confidential services:

- A 24-hour hot line at 828-254-0516 or by dialing 211
- · Emergency shelter
- · Case management
- Individual / group counseling and support
- Court advocacy
- Community education

Services are available in English and Spanish and interpreters are available for additional language access.

Burgess-Johnson stressed that this work needs to be done in coordination with community partners to provide survivor services, to hold offenders accountable, to identify high risk situations and to increase awareness in the community to prevent violence. She shared plans for an exciting expansion which will increase the number of people who can be served.
