talked about the Mayan Melipona Bee Project in the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico. It's also a project that our club has granted \$11,500 to construct two new hives.

The Mayan Melipona Honey Bees are the pollinators of the Rainforest. These bees provide one of the highest medicinal honey's on the planet. These bees don't have a stinger and their hive is in the shape of a pyramid! And, their eyes are blue. Who knew?!

The Melipona Bee Project mission is about helping these bees from becoming extinct while assisting women and their communities to become bee-tenders. So far, they have helped to build three bee-yards while providing

three apprenticeships for the beekeepers. They are helping to keep the traditions that were

established 3,200 years ago of bee tending for the Mayan Melipona honey bee to survive today and for future generations. Remember-biodiversity is our biosecurity.
