President Pat introduced our speaker, Dr. Maggie Fehrman, who is a red badge member of

our club and the Superintendent of Asheville City Schools. Dr. Fehrman shared that in college, she had planned to become an anthropologist but at the urging of an advisor, she got her teaching certificate and, it turns out, education was meant to be her life's work.

Dr. Fehrman believes that public education is the foundation of our democracy in America. She believes that teachers are the single most important person to the success of a child. While the principal is critical to the success of the school, teachers impact students profoundly. There is a stark difference in our country between the haves and have-nots and education is a way to level that playing field.

Dr. Fehrman has spent her time at Asheville City Schools listening and learning about this system. She has also been tasked with evaluating potential school closure and evaluating if Asheville City Schools and Buncombe County Schools should merge.
