COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

Council elevates Rotaract

The 2019 Council has completed its work. Among its most important actions, the Council elevated the status of Rotaract clubs, allowing them to join Rotary International the way that Rotary clubs do. The change is intended to increase the support that Rotaract clubs receive from RI and to enhance their ability to serve. The Council is made up of representatives from each Rotary district, and meets every three years in Chicago, Illinois, USA, to review the rules that govern the organization.

Dues increase

As for dues, the Council approved a modest increase of \$1 a year for each of three years, beginning in 2020-21. The previous Council set dues for 2019-20 at \$34 per half year. With the increase, the dues that clubs pay to RI per member will increase to \$34.50 per half year in 2020-21, \$35 per half year in 2021-22, and \$35.50 per half year in 2022-23. The dues will not be raised again until a future Council votes to change it.

Each water filter provides clean water to a family for two years impacting over 500 people in Guatemala.

MEMBERSHIP TIDBITS April 2019

The Rotary 2018-2019 year is almost over; in fact, there are only two months remaining. How is your club doing with membership? Governor Isaac will recognize the clubs with the highest percentage of membership growth at the Foundation Banquet in November. That means keep recruiting new members and work on retaining your existing members. Make a call to members that have not been engaged and are in danger of leaving Rotary to encourage them to reengage. Attrition is real. Try to lower your club's attrition rate. Membership ends June 30, 2019.

CONGRATULATIONS are in order again for all the clubs in district 7670! Our district remains the top district in the Zone with the highest percentage of membership gains. Rotary membership worldwide is 1,222,438 as of March 31, 2019, which represents a growth of 27,331, since July 1, 2018. As of April 15, 2019, the district membership stands at 2,278, which represents a growth of 97, since July 1, 2018. Twentyone clubs have exceeded Governors Isaac's goal of a seven percent increase in membership. Additionally, a total of 32 clubs have growth in membership this year. One club has a 66% increase in membership, and eight clubs have a 20% or higher increase in membership. **Way to GO!** Please check the district membership growth.

The Rotary Club of Arden has a 66.7% membership growth this year. How did they do it? They did it by hosting a Discover Rotary Event. All their members invited potential members to the special meeting. The club presented information about Rotary and shared all the good that the Club is doing, and then most importantly they invited them to join The Rotary Club of Arden. It worked! They grew from six members to ten. **Way to Go! A 66.7 % GROWTH.**

Rocky Jacobs, Zone Coordinator for PolioPlus, reports...we are almost at \$1.4M in club contributions and District DDF transfers



this year. Our per-capita average for the Zone so far this year is \$42.34. Our goals for the Zone this year were to break the \$2M mark again as we have the last two years, and to break \$60 in per-capita average in polio giving.

Our goal for Cubs was a \$1500 average in each District. We are close to \$1200 at this point. In the next two and one half months can we try to have just one more fund raising effort in each club in your district? If we can make one more coordinated effort in every club and district in our Zone, we can reach our goals and do our part to help eradicate the wild polio virus and keep the commitment we made to the mothers and children of the world when we began this humanitarian effort.
