The Governor's Club of Excellence Award and Distinguished Club Citation (also known as the Pink Pages) are ways to highlight your accomplishments for this Rotary year. This year I set the deadline after our year is completed. So you have another month to work in these areas and have until July 10, 2022, to submit them. This past year has been difficult or impossible to deal with some of the specific areas. This year you do not have to have a minimum of ten points in the Youth Services. However, all of the points you do have in this area still count toward your total.
