




















Fabulous Weekend of Learning for District Leaders!!

Funds given at kettles stay in the community of donation and are used to fill the needs of the community for such issues as Christmas family assistance, year-round assistance for low-income families and individuals, food pantries, youth programs, summer camps, character-building classes, homeless assistance, veterans' programs, seniors' assistance, case management, counseling and more. The Salvation Army is motivated by the love of God and incorporates the four Cs into their organizational strategy:

-Catastrophe: offering rescue and response teams -Crisis: emergency food and shelter -Children: Boys & Girls Club and Christmas assistance -Church: The Salvation Army holds a Sunday service each week, along with weekly bible studies. Their work is God's work.

Mr. Dan Timmerman and his wife, Paula, coordinate Rotarians to work through

the holidays to assist with "ringing the bell" for The Salvation Army Red Kettle Program. This year over 30 Rotarian volunteers donated nearly 40 hours towards the Red Kettle initiative.

Rotary is a global network of 1.2 million neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves. Wet & Thundery 17th Annual Charity Chase Half Marathon

Despite an early thunderstorm that delayed the starts by an hour, the 17th Annual Charity Chase Half Marathon and the 5K were run last Saturday, April 22nd, under cool but wet conditions. Great day for ducks and runners! Race Director Chad Bolick thanked the runners and volunteers for their perseverance and support in making possible the running of this major charitable event.

Barry Thomas of Hickory was the winner of the Half Marathon with a time of 1 hour, 25 minutes, and 34 seconds (01:25:33.90). Jessica James, also from Hickory, was the top Female runner with a time of 1 hour, 41 minutes, and 12 seconds (1:41:12.32). In the Men's Division Martin Harrison of Davidson and Steve McClure of Lincolnton were second and third, respectively. In the Women's Division Mary Katherine Mull of Morganton and Lauren King of Hudson were second and third, respectively.

In the Charity Chase 5K the overall winner was Wesley Gurley of Marion, NC with a time of 19 minutes and 22 seconds (0:19:21.67). Second overall and winner in the Women's Division was Elizabeth Grose of Claremont, NC with a time of 21 minutes and 27 seconds



(0:21:26.40). Third overall and second in the Women's Division was Shelby Gurley with a time of 0:21:34.61. Nine-year-old Liam Chapman of Morganton, NC was fourth overall and second in the Men's Division with a time 0:21:58.94. Maggie Tortoledo of Hickory was fifth overall and third in the Women's Division and Michael Martin of Statesville was sixth overall and third in the Men's Division.

One hundred thirty-seven ran the Charity Chase Half Marathon, while fifty ran the 5K. Charity Chase has raised nearly \$400,000 for local charities over the past few years, and for many groups in Catawba County it is their primary or only source of funding. Eighteen non-profits provided the volunteers necessary to stage the event, considered the major premier running event for our region, and split the proceeds based on the volunteer hours they each contribute. The organizing sponsor is The Rotary Club of Catawba Valley and local businesses and

individuals provide the funds and in-kind contributions necessary to stage the event and distribute to the local charities.
