District Assembly helps presidents-elect build on the leadership skills obtained at the training journey (Pre-PETS and PETS), while incoming Club Leaders/Committee Chairs learn what they need to know about their new roles and/or look at ways to refine their goals for the coming year.

The last few years, District Assembly (also known as Spring Assembly), was done via Zoom. (In 2022, we did a

marathon day of back-to-back sessions and in 2021, we did multiple one-hour sessions each week for several weeks). Prior to the pandemic, our District conducted these sessions in person at a location in the Asheville area. I also found it amazing how powerful Rotary is. 130 nations with represented leadership all speaking one language....ROTARY!


I look forward to serving you this upcoming year as your district governor as we all work together to "Create Hope in the World"

Remind me, What Does DEI Mean??

You may be wondering who asked that question in the headline? When I sought help with DEI work, I was asked the same question by a member of the district leadership. I learned the question represents one end of the district's DEI normal distribution curve. The curve is skewed toward the "What does DEI mean?" Five clubs are on the other end of the curve because they have adopted the RI Commitment statement, appointed a DEI committee chair, and are people of action in the spirit of DEI: Brevard, Catawba Valley, Hickory – Sunrise, Mountaintop – Highlands, and Madison County.

A little history...Rotary International issued its first DEI Commitment statement in 2019 and revised it in 2021. Rotary District 7670 established a DEI Committee in 2020-21, but found a rocky road ahead. In November 2022, the District Governor recruited the new chair and committee members through 2023-24

The mission of the now-stabilized committee is to help presidents and presidents-elect educate their

members to be self-assessed advocates for RI's DEI Commitment. Self-assessed refers to clubs being members of RI, not members of the district.

The committee's objectives for implementing the mission:

- 1. January March 2023 Listen to the clubs presidents' and presidents'-elect thoughts and feelings about RI's DEI emphasis.
- 2. April June 2023 Offer clubs help based on the club leaders' words.



2023 - 24 RI Presidential Theme Announced

called for members to capture the world's attention and lead the way toward possibilities far beyond our current expectations.

McInally, a member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, West Lothian, Scotland, revealed the 2023-24 presidential theme, *Create Hope in the World*, during the Rotary International Assembly in Orlando, Florida, USA, on 9 January. He urged members to promote peace in troubled nations, help those affected by conflict, and maintain the momentum of initiatives begun by past leaders.

"The goal is to restore hope — to help the world heal from destructive conflicts and, in turn, to help us achieve lasting change for ourselves," McInally said at Rotary's annual training event for incoming district governors.

McInally spoke about a woman he met in Ban Taling Chan, Thailand, where Rotary members helped build houses, a meeting hall, and childcare and health care facilities following the tsunami that devastated South Asia in late 2004. The woman had lost her husband, her daughter, and her son in the tsunami, as well as her livelihood. But she still had a gift to offer McInally: a beautiful seashell.

"She went on to tell me that Rotary... had restored her optimism. We gave her hope," McInally said.

"This is how Rotary brings lasting change to the world," he added, "one restored or newly created hope at a time."

With the guidance of our MemoryCare team, we now have confidence in our ability to live together at home as long as possible and are truly grateful for their care and encouragement.
