## Jeff Jones, Rotary Global Grant Scholar

Has Your Club Elected Officers?

This is the fourth in a series of Global Grant Scholar spotlights.

Jeffrey Jones is one of the five Global Grant Scholars being sponsored by District 7670 this year. He was awarded a Global Grant Scholarship to continue his studies in the Rotary Areas of Focus of both Disease Prevention and Treatment, and Maternal and Child Health.

Prior to being awarded a Rotary Global Grant Scholarship to undertake his PhD. research studies at Oxford University, Jeff attended the University of North Carolina Asheville for his undergraduate degree in Psychology, Minor Health and Wellness Promotion, graduating in 2020. He went on to study for a Master of Bioethics degree at the



Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health in Baltimore, where he graduated in 2021. Subsequently, Jeff served as a researcher with the Johns Hopkins Berman Institute of Bioethics, working with researchers at Oxford University and the Global Infectious Disease Ethics Collaborative. He was also a co-creator of The North Carolina Center for Health and Wellness Social Bridging Project, where he worked one-on-one with older adults in Western North Carolina, before being offered a PhD Research position at the Oxford University, Nuffield Department of Population Health. His research is titled "Healthcare inequalities and ethical resource allocation: reconfiguring priority setting decisions to tackle inequalities of access and outcome.†Starting in Oxford in the Fall of 2023, Jeff expects to complete this work in 2026.

Jeff explains  $\hat{a} \in \infty$  My entire professional career has been and currently is focused on disease prevention by promoting health and well-being across the lifespan. I have focused on the treatment of disease and child health by addressing ethical issues within the broad categories of health systems and health policy. $\hat{a} \in$  Upon completion of the PhD program and returning to the US, Jeff plans to remain within the academic research field as a professor or post-doctoral fellow and teach courses in public health and bioethics. He also intends to conduct original research on topics that relate to healthcare and public health ethics and to the ethical allocation of medical resources. Included in these plans are projects that examine how to better serve vulnerable groups, such as children with medical complexity and older adults.

## **Rotary Club of Morganton Pancake Breakfast Returns!**

It's BACK! The Rotary Club of Morganton's Annual Pancake Breakfast is returning.

The Saturday morning breakfast feast that draws hundreds of people to the Community House started in 1959. It's been a cornerstone in Morganton's March activities since, except for the little hiatus caused by COVID-19.

It's more than pancakes and bacon. It's a community event loaded with friendship and fellowship, with proceeds supporting the Morganton Rotary Club's local causes including scholarships, backpack and food support programs.

**PRICE:** Tickets are \$8 per person. (If youâ€<sup>™</sup>re tight with a Rotarian, he or she may just give you a couple!) Tickets can be purchased online (MorgantonRotary.org) and at The Paperâ€<sup>™</sup>s office at 110 S. Sterling St. in downtown Morganton.

To celebrate the return of the Annual (except for COVID) Pancake Breakfast, this year's event will feature a Kid Zone, 50/50 Raffle, Raffle for Prizes, and ukulele music.

"The pancake breakfast has been a tradition in Morganton's history,†said Morganton Mayor Ronnie Thompson. "Traditionally it was held right before the November election and gave the candidates and the people of Burke County a chance to mingle. This year it's being held right before the March primary and so that tradition may continue."

Ron George, past club president 2015-16, joined the club in 1996. He says the pancake breakfast was already a fixture of the club when he joined.  $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{C}$ Pancake breakfasts were always a place where old friendships were renewed. The same people came every year and really looked forward to it,  $\hat{a}\in$  he said.

Marty Sohovich joined the club in 1999. Of pancake breakfasts in previous years, he said, "It was a great coming together of community leaders serving pancakes to everybody. People got served by the Superintendent of Schools, police chief, pastors."

For club member and Chief Go-Getter, Kim Van Sickler, who is also President-Elect of the Morganton Rotary organization, this is her first Pancake Breakfast. "It's a little ironic that I've never attended a Morganton Pancake Breakfast and yet somehow I'm running it this year  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ but in a way it's kind of awesome too. $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$

Randall Bracket, Sergeant at Arms for the club since the mid-1980's, has worked just about every position possible for the pancake breakfasts. "I ran it for a few years. I've cooked pancakes, bussed tables, greeted people and through it all it has been incredibly rewarding to see people coming together like this once a year. I love everything about these pancake breakfasts."

Karen Milner, club director, said, "It's not just pancakes! I didn't expect that. But I helped in the serving line and there was sausage and eggs

and fruit and everything you'd want for a full breakfast." Also, "I loved seeing the people come through and how excited the kids were."
