Where does The CART Fund get it's administrative funds?



Founded in 1995 by Roger Ackerman, a Rotarian in Sumter, SC, The CART Fund (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust) is a non-profit grassroots organization that provides "seed†money for cutting edge, high impact research grants to help find a treatment or cure for Alzheimer's Disease.

Roger passed away in 2018, yet to this day, we still adhere to our founder's initial mission â€" that 100% of every dollar donated goes directly to research! So where do we get the funds for administrative work?

Trac Support is a separate 501(c)3 organization created in 2018 to allow CART to continue the original mission of designating 100% of all donations directly to research. It is funded primarily from returns on investments, as well as some planned gifts and specific fundraisers coordinated by

All funds donated to TRAC are used for operational and administrative programs to support our large volunteer base and part-time Executive Director. The CART Fund relies heavily on volunteers to share our message, promote our brand and increase our annual contributions.

TRAC is also supported by several Rotary Districts who believe in our mission and want to help us maintain our original intent of 100% of all CART contributions going directly to research. Some Rotary Clubs and Districts even host fundraisers designated for this purpose, including the annual CARS for CART Raffle in Eastern North

Carolina.

Now Taking 2024 Tennent Scholarship Applications!

Rotary Club of Asheville has a commitment to helping our community and one of the ways we do this is through our annual needs-based Tennent Scholarship.

The Buzz Tennent Scholarship was established by the Rotary Club of Asheville to support post high school students to achieve knowledge and skills essential for life and careers. Buzz Tennent was a Past President of the Rotary Club of Asheville (1939-1940) who went on to serve as District Governor in 1943-1944 and President of Rotary International in 1957-1958. The funds for the scholarship are donated by club members or raised through various fundraisers held throughout the year.

Those graduating from high school in 2024 are eligible to apply. Application deadline is April 14, 2024.

Additional requirements and guidelines are:

They must be a Buncombe County student (city, county, or private school)

They must provide a transcript of their grades

They must have successful out of school activities, e.g. work, volunteer, study, intern.

They must attach 3 letters of recommendation: at least 1 from teacher, other 2 from non-family sources

They must provide Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) documentation
They must answer each question and provide all requested information on the application

They must provide a photo

Racing For Rotary Championship Series Kicks-off in March



The Rotary Club of Newton Conover has partnered with Little Mountain Kart Club to offer Racing For Rotary. The event will be held on Saturday, March 30, at the Hickory American Legion Fairgrounds (off of Hwy. 70, 1 American Legion Ave, Newton, NC 28658).

The Rotary Club of Newton Conover has been in partnership with Little Mountain Kart Club since 2021. This year Racing For



Rotary will offer a Championship Kart Series presented by Dale Earnhardt Chevrolet. Four races are planned with points earned going toward the Championship Series; all classes are included. A new location for the 2024 kart races, Hickory American Legion Fairgrounds, will offer more parking, improved spectator space, and areas for onsite food trucks and concessions.

Racing For Rotary is a family-friendly event that offers kart races for all series of drivers while raising money for local non-profits in Catawba County. These funds support organizations' continued good work in our county. More than \$18,000 has been distributed from previous Racing For Rotary events.

"We are excited about our new location at the Hickory American Legion Fairgrounds,†shared Rotarian Corky Upchurch. "The new location will prove to be a win for all of usâ€" racers, sponsors, and community. The track has been upgraded, prepped and is ready for the first race on March 30. The Championship Series presented by Dale Earnhardt Chevrolet will bring new excitement to the races.â€

The March 30th Racing for Rotary kart races include Clone, Briggs L0206, Champ Buggies (Clone or L0206), Kids "Gutsy Gussy Racersâ€, Stock Appearing, RWYB, Yamaha 450 Outlaws, Yamaha 450 Outlaws, Yamaha 450 Outlaws Young Guns, and Predator classes. Kart registration fees are \$25 per class entry.

The other 2024 series dates are May 25, July 20, and October 12. Everyone is invited for good family-fun with proceeds from the kart races to help local organizations in Catawba County,†shared Rotarian President Siobhan Loendorf.

General admission is \$15, 10 years and under are free. Kart registration fees are \$25 per class entry. Gates open at 9am and practice/qualifying begins at approximately 12 noon followed by races. Concessions will be available. In case of heavy rain, the race will be canceled.

The club had 2 goals: raise money for our foundation to support scholarships, grants, our environmental project, and gain additional items for our Health and Hygiene Program.

Both goals were met! The community filled 4 bins of hygiene items that were delivered to the Buncombe County Schools Family Resource Center, and added a nice sum to the foundation. None of the efforts could have succeeded without all the support of club members, sponsors, and donations from some great businesses in Asheville.

The Cripple Creek Stream Restoration Project was created through a partnership between the YMCA of Catawba Valley and the Catawba County Soil and Water Conservation District. The goal of this \$93,000 project was to restore approximately 500 linear feet of degraded stream and 0.6 acres of buffer along Cripple Creek, running beside the Hickory Foundation YMCA in Catawba County. With virtually all the funding expended for the required major excavation work, it was apparent that volunteers would be needed to complete the final hands-on portion of the project. In September 2023, the Rotary Club of Catawba Valley was approached about volunteering to help with this last important step by Randy Willis, Catawba Soil and Water Conservation District Administrator.

The completion of the restoration project was required before the YMCA could begin construction of other important initiatives of the YMCA. Hickory Foundation YMCA President Paxton Tallent was quoted in a Hickory Daily Record article published September 2023, â€ceOur YMCA has a history of serving the community when they need us most. At times, we have dealt with rising waters, and through our capital initiative, we are taking steps to relocate our power/mechanical room which currently sits below ground level. This project is another step to ensure our YMCA is protected while trying our best to flood proof our facilities through various design strategies.â€

The request for volunteers included assistance with planting grasses, shrubs, and trees to provide stability to the creek banks. Upon receiving the invitation to assist, we quickly began recruiting volunteers within our club. As usual, a number of Rotarians immediately stepped up and agreed to help with this important project. There were two phases to the plantings, one in the September and one in February.

The professional staff of the Catawba Soil and Water Conservation District provided the materials and expertise and worked beside our Rotary Club volunteers. Phase one consisted of planting 462 ornamental grasses and wildflower plugs along the creek bank. Phase two consisted of planting hydrangeas, azaleas and other colorful shrubs as well as Red Bud trees. The Rotary volunteers were immensely grateful to the Catawba County Soil and Water staff for pre-drilling the holes with an auger to reduce the amount of labor and time required for planting the 65 shrubs and trees. In all, there were 8 volunteers from the Rotary Club of Catawba Valley that donated a total of 22.5-man hours to complete both phases.

The Rotary Club of Catawba Valley is a very hands-on and active club. Volunteering is part of our DNA. The project designed and ably supervised by the two Catawba County Soil and Water District staff members, fit our project profile like a "gloveâ€. We were honored to be invited to participate and excited to see the gifts of our labor come to life this spring.
